Clint Caudill, of the Wolf Branch community, had his soil sampled last week in order to take the guessing out of his fertilization program.

Jay Johnson, of the Hooker community, planted five thousand white pines on some steep eroded land last week. Mr. Johnson is planning to use his most desirable land for cultivation and pasture, and let pines care for the remainder.
