### STATE NEWS

Condensed Items of Interest Happening Throughout the State.

Mr. Geo. D. Green possesses a number of rare old newspapers that are indeed interesting, and recently it was our privilege to examine some of them. We were especially struck with a photograph of the blockade runner, "The Advance." This probably is the only picture of this noted war vessel that experienced many escapes while bringing supplies to the beleaguered cities of the South, and to our armies in the field. Mr. Green has in his possession an autograph letter from Governor Vance with reference to the blockade—Wilson Times.

In the city is Mr. Edward Bayley, of Edinburgh, Scotland, the Scotch philanthropist, who has been the moving power in sending quite a large number of young Scotchmen to North Carolina. He and the late T. K. Bruner were friends, and Mr. Bruner secured his aid, most of the young men coming from Mr. Bayley's Sunday School class. After having gone to Asheville and to see some of the boys who had gone to Western North Carolina, Mr. Bayley has been spending some time in Robeson county, where a number of the young Scotchmen are located. He finds that they are doing well and he is greatly pleased with the condition that he has found. Mr. Bayley will this week leave America to return to Scotland, and it is likely that as the result of his visit, other Scotchmen will locate in North Carolina.—News and Observer.

Yesterday morning a railroad detective caught a negro man in the act of rifling a box car, he at once arrested him and brought him to the police station, while the officers were getting the particulars of the arrest, the negro decided to take "French leave," he was on his way to freedom when first noticed by one of the officers who at once started in pursuit. After dodging around several blocks he headed for the river, but by that time others had joined the chase and he found himself cornered. He was taken in charge by Mr. H. H. Tooker, and escorted back to the jail.—New Bern Journal.

The appointment of James M. Millikan as clerk of the United States Circuit and District courts has been approved by Circuit Judges Goff and Pritchard, and an order was filed in the United States Circuit court yesterday by Judge Boyd appointing Mr. Millikan clerk of the said courts.

Mr. Millikan has already forwarded his resignation as marshal of the Western district, to take effect October 1, when he will enter upon his new duties. The order also provides that he give two bonds of 10,000 each, and take the oath prescribed by law before entering upon his duties. Although it has not been officially announced, it is generally understood that Chief Deputy Marshal J. M. Bailey will be designated by the court to fill the place made vacant by the resignation of Marshal Millikan, pending the appointment of his successor.—Greensboro News.

Sportsmen will be glad to know that the outlook for the quail shooting is very good indeed. The season begins November 1st in almost all the counties, and it is safe to say that the birds have been protected better than ever, very largely by public sentiment, in a considerable area of the State. There are counties, however, where the game laws are not heeded at all. The last legislature took some counties from the protection of the Audubon Society, but these will probably be restored at the next session.
