

NO AGREEMENT YET

Prospects Unfavorable for Rivers and Harbors Bill.

NOT IN LINE WITH 1902 ACT

Several Amendments Added Which Are Striking Blows—All Terms in Controversy Due to Engineers Having Reported Adversely or Not at All.

Washington, D. C., May 28.—The River and Harbor bill is still in conference and with little or no prospect of an early agreement, because eight of the Senate amendments are out of line with the act of 1902 which requires a favorable report from the Board of Army Engineers.

The act of 1902 provides that after Congress has ordered the survey of a project, the local or district engineer reports upon the advisability, adequacy, cost and commercial importance of the improvement.

DRYS LOSING?

United States Brewers' Association Say "Dry" Territory is Rapidly Changing Back to "Wet."

Washington, D. C., May 28.—The status of the prohibition situation in various parts of the country, but especially in the South, will be one of the subjects considered at the annual convention of the United States Brewers' Association which meets at Washington on June 3 and 5.

A report just issued by the department of internal revenue for the month of March, 1910, shows a decided improvement in the brewers' situation.

It is recalled that the beer sales for the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1909, showed a decrease of 4.14 per cent as compared with the previous year, the total amount of beer sold being 59,392,497 barrels of 31 gallons.
