English Brass.

The composition of English brass is short seventy parts copper and thirty of zinc. "Prince Rupert's metal" contains 75 to 80 per cent of copper and, on account of its golden color, is employed to some extent in jewelry. It is the alloy used for the manufacture of what is called Dutch metal, an initiation of gold leaf.
