I was arrested soon after in Washington county and Sheriff Geo. E. Ricks, of Beaufort county, was notified and went after me, bringing me back to the Beaufort county chain gang. I have no complaint whatever to make at the treatment which I received while in the custody of Sheriff Ricks; he treated me as well as any prisoner could expect. On my return to the convict camp of Beaufort county by Sheriff Ricks, Captain Hodges whipped me. Sheriff Ricks had nothing whatever to do with the whipping; in fact, he would never have seen it had he not been detained at the camp by a heavy rain.

I make this statement freely and willingly, of my own accord, in justice to Sheriff Ricks, and it is unfair for any one to try to connect him with it in any way.

A LIE CORRECTED.

In justice to Sheriff Ricks please read the following statements:

J. D. Aldridge, being duly sworn, says:

"I was a guard at the convict camp when Derwood Bateman was delivered by Sheriff Ricks to me, just at the beginning of a heavy rainfall; and the Sheriff was detained at the camp about 1-2 hours on account of the rain. During this time Bateman was whipped by Captain Hodges, as other prisoners under similar circumstances. The Sheriff had nothing whatever to do with the whipping, neither did he make any suggestions in anyway about it."
