AGED REFORMER PASSES AWAY

Ashtore, Nov. 20.—Count Leo Tolstoy, the noted Russian novelist and reformer, died here at 6:05 a. m. after suffering from severe attacks of heart failure throughout the night.

The attending physicians had told Tolstoy's son, Michael, of the Count's serious condition and the family were expecting the end.

Tolstoy had suffered several serious attacks of heart failure during the night. During early morning hours these followed each other in rapid succession but were quickly relieved.

Between the first and second attack the members of the family were admitted to the bedside.

Tolstoy's condition after each attack was what the attending physician called "deceptively encouraging."

Today the patient slept a little, seeming to breathe more comfortably than usual.

CRIPPEN NOT AFRAID TO DIE

London, Nov. 20.—Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, whose execution is fixed for Nov. 23, in a three column signed statement in a Sunday paper says that he is not afraid to die and bowed to the inevitable.

He knew nothing he says of the remains discovered in the Hilldrop Crescent house until Solicitor Newton told him the day after his arrival at Bow Street.

The failure of his appeal, which he was convinced would reverse the judgment of the court, crushed and overwhelmed him.

Mr. Jon's Dead.

Mr. Haywood Jones of Whartons, N. C., was brought to the Washington Hospital last Saturday afternoon for treatment but his condition was such there was no hope for him after examination by the physicians at the hospital.

He passed away Saturday night and the remains were carried to Whartons on the Atlantic Coast Line Sunday morning.

The burial took place this afternoon. The deceased was between sixty and seventy years of age and leaves a widow and several daughters. This paper extends sympathy.

MURDER HID FOR YEARS

Even the sex of the victim was not known, the five years or more during which the body is known to have reposed in its hiding place, having reduced it to a skeleton almost bare of flesh.

From outward indications, however, the authorities are of the belief that the body is that of a woman, the smallness of the bones chiefly leading them to that conclusion.

Early today the body—discovered by Philip Meagher, when he was preparing to move yesterday after eight years' residence in the house and opened the neglected trunk—was taken to the morgue. It was found that the body had been jammed into the trunk and surrounded with quantities of plaster of Paris and paper.

The only clue is the name "W. Lewis," which appears on the outside of the trunk. Lewis was boarder in the Meagher family up to six years ago.

He told Meagher on going away that he would leave the trunk and call for it at some future time. The zinc tank inside the trunk fits perfectly.

The newspapers were dated from February 19th to April 17th, 1903.
