REBELS THREATEN AGUAS CALIENTES

Federals Liberate Women Who Fought With Insurgents.

INSURRECTOS ON THE MOVE

Nine Hundred Insurgents May Capture the State Capital—Have Obtained Supplies From American Mines—Hostile in Expectation at Valparaiso—Fate in Doubt.

30 Febr. Tex., April 9.—Advisors from Terrell say that Aguas Calientes, capital of the state of the same name, and the centre of the drawn back troops in Mexico, is threatened by a force of nine hundred insurgents.

Four hundred men are said to be advancing on Comanche in Northern Zacatecas.

An insurrection is reported on the Parras river in Coahuila. All horses, arms and supplies having been taken, it is said, and many of the same workers having been impressed into service with the rebels. The mines are owned by an American company. Reinforcements from Hermosillo have gone to the assistance of the Federals driven from Astepa and a battle with the victorious insurgents in that vicinity is expected when the two federal forces form a junction.

The insurgents have abandoned Tepic, Durango, to go to Valparaiso to reinforce the rebel forces battling with the Federals in that vicinity. It is reported the Federals have formed an alliance with the Coahuila Indians near Durango under command by which the Indians are to have their lands and rights restored.

Material is still being taken from here to Parras and Casas Grandes for railroad extension work. The natives it is said are rapidly leaving that region since the Federal troops were withdrawn from Casas Grandes. Practically all civil officials have fled.

El Paso, Tex., April 10.—Patrocinia Vasquez, 16 years old, the only girl who fought in the rebel ranks at Casas Grandes in the battle of March 8, has been liberated. With the other insurgent prisoners she was held in jail for several days then was released and invited to leave the country.

She joined the insurgent army at Santa Tomas in Chihuahua with her father and was with Orosco's command for several days before the battle.

She fought gallantly, it is said, and was captured by the injured Federals and insurgent allies.

Washington, April 10.—A petition signed by 255 citizens of El Paso, Texas, urging the United States not to interfere in the insurrection, is before the Senate. The petition was presented to the Senate today by Senator Calhoun. The signers express the opinion that the struggle is one for resistance on the part of the insurgents.

Mexico City, April 10.—The fate of Zacatecas which was attacked by the rebels yesterday has not been learned here today owing to the cutting of the telegram wires. The rebel wire is said to have ceased in the afternoon following six hours of fighting.

Brown, left this morning via the Norfolk Southern Road for Raleigh to confer with the governor and the council of state with reference to the construction of the Matamoros railroad from Belhaven to Washington.
