CHILD IS BURIED ALIVE

Father Admits Brutal Murder in California Court—Wife is Charged Jointly for Crime.

San Francisco, Cal.—Charged with murdering his infant son, John Rech, an Italian, was before the Superior court of California, recently. Rech was a willing witness and told the court that he and his wife had talked about "putting away" their child thousands of times that they might have more money to send to the old folks in Italy.

In his statement Rech declared he took the baby back of the barn at his home, where he had dug a hole and, placing the babe in a sitting posture, filled the hole with earth. The death wounds found on the babe's head were inflicted, Rech said, by his shovel when he tamped down the dirt.

The proceedings in court were not lengthy. After Rech's statement had been made it was read over to him by the interpreter and he readily signed it. As he affixed his name to the document, which the authorities declare is virtually his death warrant, Rech showed the first sign of emotion since his arrest. Large tears trickled down his cheeks and he sat silently for a few moments holding his head in his hands.
