The National One Cent Letter Postal Association has been organized with Charles W. Burrows, of Cleveland, as president, and is preparing for a vigorous campaign among the business men of the country for lower postage rates.

As a result of the campaign being conducted by this association a bill has been introduced in Congress by Senator Theodore E. Burton, of Ohio, and Representative John W. Weeks, of Massachusetts, for a one cent letter postage rate to take effect July 1st of this year. movement has been cordially indersed by President Taft, Post Master General Hitchcock and other government officials.

One of the interesting deductions made by General Britt is the fact that over eighteen million dollars was collected on post cards, the weight of which was a little over ten million pounds only. amount was just over double the total revenue received from 951,000,-000 pounds of second class mail matter produced. This latter was ninety-tive times as much in weight and furnished less than \$9,000,000

SOUTHERN COTTON CROPS THIS YEAR.

According to the best opinion in New York-cotton and grain circles as the New York Commercial hears it, the Southern farmer who finds himself behind in his Spring work will prefer corn for late planting. "The South," argues our business contemporary, "can deliver its new erop of corn next September, and the price of September corn in Chicago Jast Wednesday was 75 5-8 cents as compared with 51 cents a year-On the same day September cotton was quoted at 11:40 cents. as compared with 13.8 cents a year ago. If a planter wishes to sell against his crop new, corn would pay him much better than cotton. The Commercial also points out that with the corn the boll weevil risk is eliminated and many advantages over cotton as a farming proposition are enjoyed. Unquestionably earn is now a better prospect than eatten, even from the speculative standpoint. And a speculation in ection growing which goes wrong does serious hurt, while corn growing, within any sort of reasonable limits, is not speculation at all but the avoidance thereof

THE GREATEST OF OCEAN DISASTERS

The hopeful expectations aroused by the early news of the Titanic's collision with an iceberg off Cape Race have been blasted by the event, and the initial celebration of man's greatest achievement in marine construction has been turned into the greatest of ocean disasters.

Nothing could exceed in sensational character this apalling castro-Proclaimed as the last in modern building for sea transportation of this giant vessel throws us back violently again to a consideration of first principles.

All the boasted and wonderful progress made in throwing safeguards about ocean travel seems to have been turned into mockery. Water-tight compartments as an unfailing protection against sinking have become fallible. Wireless telegraphy has proved inadequate against the failure of a ship to keep afloat. The great and greates bulk of hull raises greater forces in collision and creates dangers which may overcome its safeguards.

But the world learns only from sore expierence, and it will learn from this that the way of safety in ocean navigation does not lie for each package. Address all orders to along the face course for size in vessel building, and that economy of treasure as well as life may better be found in less ambitions ways. The rivalry of the great transatlantic companies in giant construc-tion has received a fearful check.—New York World.
