TWELVE PASSENGERS INJURED ON THE NORFOLK-SOUTHERN RAILROAD SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Second Class Coach Jumped Track Near Norfolk Followed by First Class and Chair Coaches.

THOSE FROM HERE NOT HURT

Accident Happened Between Hickory Ground and St. Brides Stations. Track Now Clear

Twelve persons are reported injured but none seriously due to the second class coach of the Norfolk Southern through passenger train running from New Bern to Norfolk jumping the track yesterday afternoon.

The accident occurred between Hickory Ground and St. Brides, this side of Norfolk. Several passengers were on the train from this city including A. D. MacLean, J. L. Cape heart, Thomas Lewis, C. H. Richardson and wife and others.

The passenger train left here yesterday morning at 10:55 and was in charge of Conductor Ferebee and Engineer Weisger.

When running between Hickory Ground and St. Brides stations for some unknown reason the second class coach jumped the track. The second class coach was followed by the first class and chair cars.

A wrecking car was soon on the scene from Norfolk and the wreckage was cleared in time for the regular night train running from Norfolk to Raleigh to pass. The accident happened between two and three o'clock.
