ORANGE, N. J., July 15 .- Right Rev. Dr. Thomas Bowman, the senior bishop of the Methodist Episcopal denomination, today quietly celebrated his ninetyfifth birthday anniversary at the residence of his son-in-law Burn D. Caldwell, of this place. The venerable bishop was the recipient of an almost countless number of congratulatory messages from prom inent laymen and clergymen throughout the country. Despite his advance ed age he is in fair health and may be seen on the streets of Orange al-most any day in suitable weather.

Bishop Dowman is the oldest Amer ican bishop, both in years and in point of service. He is likewis the only survivor that graduated from Dickinson College in 1837. The June in which he received his diploma. seventy-five years ago, was that in which Victoria became Queen of Great Britain.

The Bishop was born at Berwick Pa., and was a frail delicate boy un-til taken to Massachusetts, where a daily walk of three miles to school at Wilbraham, laid—so he thinks—the foundation of a healthful life.
