ORDINANCE
 At a special called meeting of the
 Board of Aldermen August 8th, the
 following ordinance was enacted:
 The Board of Aldermen of the
 City of Washington, do ordain:
 1. That the city block bounded on
 the South by West Second Street;
 on the West by Bridge Street, on the
 North by West Third Street and on
 the East by Van Norden Street, same
 being the block upon which the Water
 Plant is located, be and the same
 hereby is created a Sanitary District.
 2. No privy shall be used in said
 district that does not conform to the
 plans and specifications recommend-
 ed by the North Carolina State Board
 of Health in its publication entitled
 "The North Carolina Sanitary Privy,"
 and no privy in said district shall be
 used as a place for the deposit of
 human excrement until a written
 permit shall have been obtained from
 the Sanitary Inspector, who shall
 issue no permit for the use of any
 privy unless the same shall be found,
 after an inspection by him, to be so
 constructed as to prevent the access
 of flies to the excrement deposited
 therein; and shall be so constructed
 as to permit the proper and easy
 places and removing of receptacles—
 inches in height and — inches in
 diameter, and shall be located so as
 to be easily accessible to the scavenger.
 3. That all horse stables and chick-
 en houses shall be cleaned out in
 said district at least once a week,
 and any person failing to so clean
 said stables and chicken houses shall
 be fined \$5.00.
 4. No person shall deposit any hu-
 man excrement within the district
 above defined except in a privy for
 which a permit has been issued or
 in a closet connected with a public
 sewer.
 5. It shall be the duty of the Sanitary
 Inspector to inspect every privy
 in said district once each week.
 6. Any person firm or corporation
 violating the provisions of this act
 shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and
 subject to a fine of not less than \$5.
 nor more than \$50.00.
