PROGRESSIVES MEET AT SYRACUSE.

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 5.—Several
thousand enthusiastic delegates and
visitors rallied in Syracuse today
for the opening of the State convention
of the Progressive party. In order
that there might be ample time for
speech-making it was decided by the
party leaders to make the convention
a two-day affair. Today's program
provided for but one session, devoted
to the work of organization, and
winding up with an address by Gov-
ernor Johnson of California, the
vice-presidential candidate on the
Roosevelt ticket. The real business
of the convention will be transacted
tomorrow. The make-up of the State
ticket is still problematical. Bain-
bridge Colby, who was a prominent
figure in the Chicago convention;
William H. Hotchkiss, late State
Superintendent of Insurance, and
several others are under discussion
for the gubernatorial nomination.
The platform will follow closely the
main features of the platform adopt-
ed at the Chicago convention, with
the addition of an extra strong plank
demanding sweeping changes in
present laws affecting political con-
tributions and expenditures.

CALGARY WELCOMES CONNAUGHT.

Calgary, Alta., Sept. 5.—The Duke
and Duchess of Connaught and their
party arrived in Calgary this after-
noon and were accorded a patriotic
welcome, in which the thousands of
carnival visitors joined with the
people of Calgary. A guard of honor
of the 103rd regiment of Calgary Rifles
was drawn up on the station platform
when the vice-regal train arrived.
The regimental band played the na-
tional anthem while the mayor and
provincial officials extended the for-
mal greetings to the Governor-Gen-
eral. The distinguished visitors are
to remain in Calgary until tomorrow
night. They will witness the big
carnival pageant and attend a num-
ber of other social functions arranged
in their honor.

of June, 1857, and reached safety after floating down the Ganges, charging
through rebel lines and standing siege in a temple. General Thomson at
that time was a captain in one of the Sepoy regiments that mutinied.

that the horses have to carry to the
fire ten or fifteen firemen besides the
wagon full of fire hose. There should
