BRITISH TRAMP STEAMER RAMS AN AMERICAN SHIP

Newport News, Va., Jan. 5.—Eight survivors of the American freighter Julia Luckenbach, rammed and sunk in Chesapeake Bay early Friday by the British tramp Indrakula, arrived here Saturday and told how 20 of their number had gone down with the ship without a chance for life. Half-crazed by his terrible fight for life and by the recollection of the awful tragedy through which he had passed, First Officer Hunt at first said that 37 persons had gone down with the ship, but subsequently it was learned that there were only 28 persons in all on board, including the crippled wife of Captain Gilbert.

BILLINGS' YACHT SALES

The yacht Vanadia, belonging to G. K. Billings, of New York, which had been anchored off Jekyll for several days prior to the departure of the Rockefeller party, left the island waters simultaneously with the departure of the Standard Oil man, but it is not known whether the Billings' yacht was placed at the disposal of Mr. Rockefeller or whether the latter left the island on a secretly chartered vessel.

It was known that William Rockefeller was in Tarrytown up to about October 25, and that he and Mrs. Rockefeller then went to the Adirondacks on a camping trip for three weeks. They then returned to Tarrytown and remained there for about three weeks, and proceeded southward.

The Washington public schools opened this morning with about 35 new pupils in attendance. This makes the total enrollment for the year 120. This establishes a new record.
