**STATE, COUNTY AND CITY OFFICEHOLDERS ESCAPE FEDERAL INCOME TAX.**  
Washington, May 14.—In the discussion of the income tax section of the Underwood tariff bill in the House of Representatives just before that body passed the measure, certain facts developed which may well be cited as samples of that technical work of law which does not command the esteem of the general public.
