CLOSING HOUR

SATURDAY NIGHT.
Is there any good reason that justifies the merchants of this town in keeping their stores open until 12 o'clock Saturday night?

If there is, we fall to see it. There is very little trading done between the hours of ten and twelve, surely not enough to justify keeping stores open for two hours longer, using lights and causing other expenses. WHY DON'T ALL THE MERCHANTS GET TOGETHER AND CLOSE AT TEN O'CLOCK SATURDAY NIGHTS?

We think we know the answer. It's because there are some men who think by keeping their stores open for a couple of hours longer, they will take in a few more pennies.

It isn't necessary that the progressive merchants be held back by other classes.

Why not call a meeting of all the owners and employees of stores which now keep open until twelve and settle the matter. Publish the names of those who are willing to close at ten and also those who are unwilling to agree to this proposition. Those last named will soon see things in their true light.

Let the people know that the stores would close at ten, those who do not make their purchases late at night, would make it a point to get to the stores before the hour of closing.

It is a matter of importance and we hope the merchants will think the matter over. In other cities, the stores close at six o'clock Saturdays and in a good many cases, they close earlier in the afternoon during the summer months.

Furthermore, if the stores in the city closed at ten, the street cleaning department of the city could get out an hour and have the streets cleaned and in good shape for Sunday morning. If they try it under present conditions, the streets would be littered with paper, boxes, refuse, etc., and they would be as bad as they were before the cleaning started.

Let P. J. Fox, Mr. Merchant, get together and discuss the matter. It's a good thing for you, for your business and your employees.

RAILROAD NOTES.
Boston & Maine has inaugurated a re-arrangement era.

The Lehigh Valley Railroad system now dispatches all trains by telephone, and within a short time all telegraphic instruments will be eliminated, both in regard to dispatching trains, and the transaction of other business of the company.

The Cordoba Central Railway of Argentina has ordered 10,000 tons of steel rails from the U. S. Steel Product Co., the export of the U. S. Steel Corporation. The Big Four has placed a large order with the American Bridge Company.

The New York Central Railroad Company has recently appointed a police interpreter at the Exchange street station, who will look after the interests of the many Polish immigrants who arrive there daily, directing them to their respective cars and seeing that they do not fall into unfortunate hands.

One of the most unique offers ever made to a railroad company is that of many clerks, engineers and others connected with the system of the Illinois Central to donate one or more days' pay to assist the company in making repairs rendered necessary by the recent tornado in Omaha and by spread damage from floods in the South.

The Agricultural, Industrial and Immigration departments of the St. Louis Southwestern have been consolidated, with W. R. Beattie in charge of the agricultural and industrial charge as agricultural commissioner, and W. J. Doyle, heretofore commissioner, in charge of the immigration duties.

Maintenance of discipline is necessary to insure safe operation of railroads. For that reason the Pennsylvania railroad is giving wide circulation among its employees to a pamphlet entitled "Why Railroad Employees Should for Their Own Safety Demand the Maintenance of Discipline." The pamphlet, which is going out over the signature of General Manager S. C. Long, contains some observation of the public service commission, State of New York, second district.

Contracts have been let by the Baldwin Locomotive Works for three miles of tracks to be used in connection with its locomotive plant to be built in East Chicago, Ind. This plant will give employment to between 4,000 and 5,000 men.

More than a year ago 370 acres at East Chicago were bought for this purpose. It is planned to have the plant in full operation during the latter part of next year. In the beginning it will have a capacity of ten locomotives a week.

The St. Paul has issued orders which provide a variety of improvements on both the Council Bluffs & Hastings and Dakota division of the system, which will cost \$20,000,000.

The most important work to be done is double tracking the route from Savannah, Ill., to Omaha, and from Minneapolis to Aberdeen, S. D. The company now has two tracks to Savannah and it is expected the extension will be completed as far as Manila, Ia., and to Omaha twelve months hence.

The Des Moines river is being bridged near Madrid, Ia., with a structure that will be 130 feet high, and ten miles of curves at various points will be eliminated. With the completion of this improvement the St. Paul will have the shortest line between Chicago and Omaha, and one having the fewest curves as well as the lowest grades.

Mr. J. Z. Green, Organizer-Lecturer of the N. C. Farmers' Union, will make a public address at Washington, N. C., Thursday, June 26th, 1913, at 11 o'clock a. m. All who are interested in Farmers' Co-Operations are urged to request to attend.
