Both N. L. Simmons and Mrs. Simmons are indisposed at their home on North Market street.

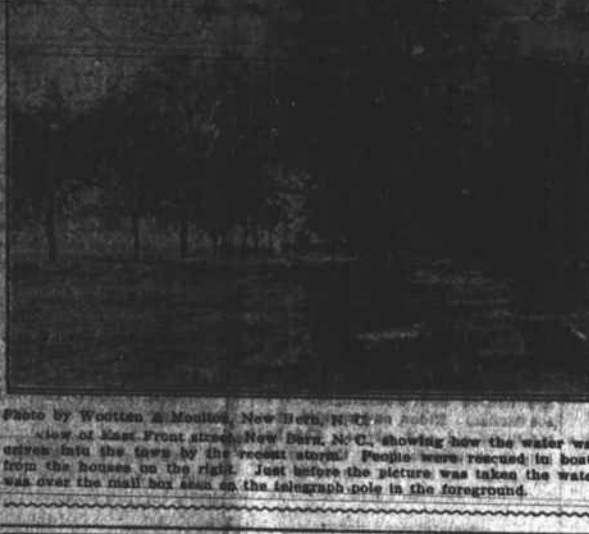
SECRETARY TAYLOR RETURNS
