NEW COLLEGE HAS CORPS OF TEACHERS SECOND TO NO INSTITUTION IN NORTH CAROLINA.

Washington Collegiate Institute which has just been opened under the auspices of the board of education of the Methodist Episcopal church, represents in its faculty the highest standards of character, training and experience.

The Rev. Edgar A. Lowther was selected by the board of education to organize the preliminary details for the beginning of school work and to be president of the institute.

The Rev. A. Rayner is a graduate of Cornell college, Mt. Vernon, Iowa, of Drew Theological Seminary. Received his master's degree (M. A.) from Cornell college, 1912, and came to the institute from Staten Island, New York City, where he was pastor of the Granville M. E. church while taking a year of graduate study in New York university.

Miss Gertrude B. Lytle, who has taken special work in Teachers College, Columbia university, New York City, comes to the institute with much experience as a teacher particularly in work with boys.

Miss Rhea O. Bryan of Etowah, Tenn., was educated in Wesleyan School of Expression, Mr. S. S. Curry, Ph. D., president, Boston, Mass. Miss Bryan will have the courses in elocution and public speaking.
