Harris, engineering officer and En-sign Andrew Sanders, engicering officer of Elizabeth City, left here Saturday morning for Elizabeth City for the purpose of bringing the

Foote to this port.

The ship left Elizabeth City Sunday and 'arrived here at the hour accident.

The ship is 165 feet long and 15 feet beam and carries four one pound guns and three torpedo tubes.

For the past eighteen months the Foote has been at the service or the Fifth Division North Carolina Naval Reserves at Elizabeth City and now she is to be the property of the Sixth Division, this city, and will be used for week-end cruises, prac-
