

CHIEF R. J. ROBERTS IS REINSTATED BY BOARD OF THE CITY ALDERMEN

CITY SOLONS HOLD MEETING

OF INTEREST

Matters of Importance Were Discussed. Ordinances Passed. Many Visitors Were Present. Specific Tax Ordinances Passed.

The Board of City Aldermen had a very interesting meeting last night at the City Hall. Interest centered principally around the selection of a Chief of Police as Chief Roberts had been suspended by the police committee, consisting of J. F. Buckman, G. G. Morris and H. L. Jones for failure to report to his superior officer for certain threats made by Benj. Ormond against Joshua W. Mills.

After discussion Chief Richard Roberts was reinstated. Alderman Bragaw, before this action was taken introduced the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That in failing to make permanent the temporary suspension of R. J. Roberts, as chief of police, it is not the intention or the purpose of this board to regulate the action of the police committee in suspending the said Roberts; on the contrary, we consider that Mr. Roberts was guilty of neglect of duty in that he failed to report the threats of Benjamin Ormond and approve of the temporary suspension as a punishment for such neglect.

In the matter of Jack's Creek, the street committee was instructed to cut ditches so that water could pass through.

As to the placing of a water fountain at the corner of Main and Gladwin streets, this was referred to the water and light committee for action.

A report from the fire committee showed that the stables belonging to Mrs. Myers on Respot street had been torn down.

Mayor Knigler was authorized to purchase garbage cans.

It was moved and seconded that the bond of the treasurer be increased to \$25,000 per year and that a voucher be drawn for the purpose of paying the premium.

On motion it was ordered that at the next meeting the city attorney make a report as to the fines and forfeitures of the mayor's court.

H. Lee Stewart was elected keeper of the city clock for the coming year at the same salary.

The city poll tax was placed at \$4.50 and the property tax at \$1.50. The following ordinance was passed:

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Washington, North Carolina, do ordain:

First: That it shall be unlawful for any person to throw any written or printed notices or posters of any kind or description upon any of the public streets or alleys of the City of Washington, or in any yard or lot in said city, or to distribute same upon the streets or alleys of the city by handing or delivering them to the passers by.

All persons who shall carry or send out written or printed posters or notices shall be required to deliver them to the occupants of houses, or place them under the front door of said houses.

Second: Any person who shall violate the provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction, be fined Ten Dollars (\$10.00).

BOND AND EHRINGHAUS ARE NAMED

The Judicial Convention met in the town of Edenon yesterday morning for the purpose of nominating a judge and a solicitor for this district. Hon. W. M. Bond was unanimously named as judge and Solicitor Ehringhaus was re-nominated by acclamation.

TWO STRONG SERMONS ON YESTERDAY

Two strong sermons were delivered at the First Presbyterian church yesterday by Rev. Frank H. Wright. In the morning he spoke on "Parental Responsibility," using as a text the passage in Proverbs, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." The preacher deprecated the decline of discipline, and the lack of authority in the home. "We are raising a lawless generation," said he, "and may expect anarchy and ruin unless we return to the old ways and train children according to the principles of God's word, which is far wiser than all our modern pedagogy." The evangelist emphasized the precious promises of the text and encouraged parents to believe that God would bless and save their children, if they would only be faithful to their trust. At the close of the service he sang "My Mother's Hands," one of his favorite songs.

Another large congregation gathered at the night service and heard a clear and comforting discourse on "Saying Faith." To believe on Christ, said the speaker involves three things:

1. To admit His Claims to be the Son of God and Savior of Men. This is an act of the intellect, and God has given us ample evidence that Jesus is what He claimed to be.

2. To submit, or surrender the will to the Lord. This said he, is the critical and crucial element of saving faith. Men are lost because they will not accept the Savior. The moment a man surrenders his will to Christ, he is saved.

3. Commit, or the abiding trust of the heart in Jesus as Lord and Redeemer. "Faith is not a fancy, it is not a feeling, but an intelligent and voluntary act of the whole soul in receiving Christ and vesting upon Him alone for salvation." "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved."

These services will not close Wednesday night, June 3rd, as at first announced, but will continue through the week. The congregations have been so large and the interest so deep, that it was decided to continue the meetings. Services daily at 11 a. m., and 8 p. m.

MRS. MANN HOSTESS TO THE CLUB

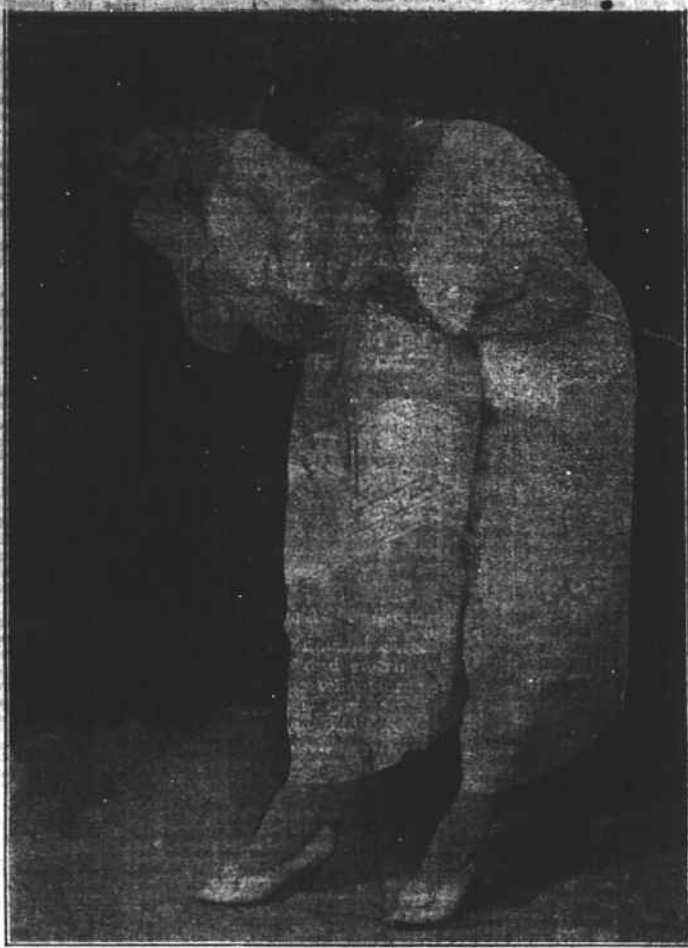

AEROPLANE FLIGHTS IN WASHINGTON ON NEXT TUESDAY, WEDNESDAY

GREATEST EVENT IN HISTORY OF THIS COUNTY

Flights Will Be From Two to Six O'clock Each Afternoon The Opportunity of a Life Time is Everyones.

The biggest event ever pulled off in Washington, in fact Eastern Carolina, is to be in Washington next Tuesday and Wednesday when the Berger Aviation Company will give flights in the air Tuesday and Wednesday of next week. The machine to be used is the Wright carrying passenger type. This is the same company that so successfully performed at New Bern last week and the thousands who witnessed the stunt are singing its praises all over Eastern Carolina. That Washington citizens and the citizens of the county are to be afforded an opportunity to witness this great stunt is due to the thoughtfulness of some of our enterprising citizens. The New Bern Journal has the following to say of the flights in that city:

"Next on the program came the flights in an aeroplane, by Eugene Heth of the Berger Aviation Company. Mr. Heth first went up alone and dropped imaginary hand grenades at a target. Each of these went true and exemplified to the throngs below of the deadly work that an aeroplane can do in warfare.

"On the second flight Mr. Heth carried along with him as a passenger, Mrs. Bayard Wooten of the Wooten-Moulton Studio. Mrs. Wooten is probably the only lady in New Bern who has been up in an aeroplane and she is very proud of this fact. As the big machine soared over the race track far into the clouds, the spectators craned their necks and followed its flight with their eyes until it had again alighted and Mrs. Wooten had alighted amidst the cheers from many throats.

The third flight consisted of a race

between the aeroplane and an automobile driven by Ben Williams. In this race the aeroplane was the winner. People are expected from all counties in Eastern Carolina. It bids fair to be a gala occasion.
