The danger of injury from the boll weers is greatest under conditions that favor the luxuriant growth of that the young plant and induce the for-mation of large sumbers of rege-tative branches, which produce no bolls. The control of the formation of these branches is the service of the new system. The suppression of these branches avoids injurious crowding of the plants and also makes it possible to leave more plants in the rows than is now customars. The most important con-sideration which the new system required is the pleutar of plants of of growth, until the stalks have wa Deyond the stage where

grown beyond the stage where vege-tative branches are preduced.

It is particularly true of the cot-ton industry that the more intesti-gent and exhibitul the farming the larger the minimal rowards. And yet, cotton has so long been considered a "sure-crop" that often it is cultivated under the most careless methods. This is one of the chief reasons for the backward state of the backward state of reasons for the backward state of the industry today. The invesion of the boll-wayll pest has, however, been forcing upon cotton raisers the necessity of more improved methless a "sure-crop". The rapid ex-pansion of cotton culture in fereign countries is an additional reason why more careful methods must be adopted in this country to attain the maximum results?

The first step is/to secure the at-tention of the intelligent farmer and convince film of the truth of the principle upon which the new sys-tem is founded. He may then ob-serve and experiment for himself with rows of cotton thinned to dif-ferent distances and at different stages of growth and may see for alm self the relation of the habits of the plants to cultural problems.

DO THE PLANETS AFFECT OUR WEATHER?

One of our correspondents wishes us to tell him through the News Let-ter whether the positions of the planets have any effect on the weather

A few people strongly assert that they do, while many others, like our correspondent, have their doubts, but however, who have given the subject careful attention are positive that none of the planets, nor even the moon, ever has any appreciable effect on the weather.

As a matter of fact all weather

changes depend ultimately upon tem-perature differences. The temperature, as we know, constitutes of itself a most important weather fac-tor. Another and equally important weather factor is rainfall. But to obtain rain it is necessary first to evaporate water from the surface of the earth, and this, as everyone knows requires heat. Still another important weather factor is the direction and force of the wind, and this too, requires heat, for the winds will not blow unless tre tempera-ture is different at one place from what it is at another any more than the air will draw up a chimney when there is no fire in it.

Since then the heating of different parts of the earth and its atmosphere to different temperatures is the real cause of the winds and of all weather changes it follows that the moon and the planets can affect the Now, according to accurate meas-

cate instruments, the amount heat sent to the earth by all the planets and also by the moon is significant in comparison to the amount that comes from the sun. Hence we could not expect either the planets or the moon appreciably to affect the weather. They do not supply enough heat, the one thing that causes all our weather changes.

To most people the above reason ing may seem quite sufficient and conclusive, but there is still another and an entirely different method of We can observe the positions of the planets and the kind of weather during of weather always comes when the This kind of examination has often been made, both for the planets and influence of either upon our weather has ever been found

We have To sum up: son to believe that neither the planets nor the moon can have any appreciable affect on the weather, because they furnish so little heat upon which all weather changes uitimately depend, and this belief is fully supported by weather records.

The belief is still to be found in all countries, that the planets and the moon do seed the weather never had any scientific basis whatever; it is only a remnant of the many su-perstitions generated and fostered by that other and greater superstition, astrology.-Ex.
