Torrents of angry and malignant passions were let loose in the primary campaign just closed (some being imported from afar.) Judging from the conduct of those who opposed the choice of the people (as it has since developed are the choice of the people) for the several offices, we are led to conclude that they who opposed those who have been selected by the Democracy of the County as its candidates mutually hoped to evince the justness of their opinion and to increase the number of their converts by the loudness of their declamations and the bitterness of their invectives. What other suggestion can we advance, if this is not so? They all have the people's approbation of their candidacy, yet were denounced by the would-be party leaders!

The primaries recently had by Beaufort's Democracy tell us that an enlightened zeal for fair play in all things, energy and efficiency in matters pertaining to our county government, an entire absence of boss-riding and ring-rule politics and of persons fond of despotic power and hostile to the ambitions of some is what old Beaufort wants and what she will have. An over-scrupulous jealousy of danger to the rights of the people, which has been and will probably be hereafter advanced by some who are seeking office or running politics, is a stale bait for popularity at the expense of the public good.

The people need no leader, except their own judgment and conscience in selecting their standard bearers; officials. Surely they do not need a criterion or critic who stands up and says "you are fit," "you are not fit." Think it over!

EXHIBITION OF ROAD MODELS

Greatest Display Ever Shown in Any Part of World Will Be Seen at San Francisco in 1915.

Arrangements are to be made by the United States department of agriculture, through Logan Waller Page, director of the office of public roads, to place on exhibition in 1915 the greatest collection of road models ever displayed in any part of the world. The models will furnish exact duplicates of the old Roman roads, French roads, and all of the various types of modern roads, together with miniature models of road machinery operated by electricity.

The office of public roads made an exhibit of road models for the first time at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition. The aim was to put on view such striking examples in miniature of road models that visitors would not only appreciate the beneficent effects of improved highways, but would at the same time be able to understand the methods of their construction.

Since the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition closed, the exhibition has been displayed at various other exhibitions and fairs. Since that time the collection has been greatly augmented until every single type of road is now represented and every known device used in the making of roads has been reproduced in miniature.

As a result of the instruction furnished by these road models, many farmers have joined forces to improve their own highways, and the road building movement has had a great impetus.

Must Be Paid for. If we are to have good roads, we must be willing to pay for them and we must be willing to pay for their maintenance, and also remember that the maintenance is of as great if not greater importance than the original construction.
