Brussels, Aug. 8 .- The war offic declares that the German artillery fire at Liege, while very severe, there was comparatively very little damage done. This is attributed to the poor marksmenship of the Germans. ANNIHILATE GERMANS.

(By the United Press.) Brussels, Aug. 8 .- General Leman who is commanding the army defending Liege, has absolutely refused the request of the Germans for an armistice. All the forts about the city of Liege are still intact and the Belgians have complete possession of the city. The war office has declared that the Burgomaster of Liege saved the city from complete destruction when he permitted a big detachmen of the Germans to enter in the circle of the fortifications and then overwhelmed them with a deadly and heavy fire from the fortifications.

The Belgians this morning made annihilated a division of the German cavalry, which had crossed the river Muse and preparing to make a charge.
