

## Kaiser Must Back Down or Fight

### Japanese Squadron Now Ready For An Attack If Germany Don't Comply

#### FOREIGNERS ASKED TO VACATE ANTWERP WITHOUT ANY DELAY

(By the United Press.)  
Antwerp, Aug. 21.—This city is being placed into a state of siege and all the foreigners are being asked to leave here just as soon as possible.

King Albert and his general staff are now here.

Fast channel steamers have been requisitioned for the purpose of carrying non-combatants either to the English or French territory.

Many of the smaller houses in the suburbs of the city have been destroyed and the trees outside of the city cut down so that the Germans will not be in a position to seek cover.

It is reported that the Germans have burned many of the Belgian villages and cleared the country for their advance from Meuse.

The conditions in the Belgian territory now occupied by the Germans is pitiable. None of the inhabitants have any money, and if they did they have no where to purchase food. The German commissary is taxed to its utmost to supply its own forces. Many of the non-combatants were killed when they were caught in the territory between the opposing forces with no way of escape. Others who unwisely endeavored to resist the Germans were shot down and their homes burned.

#### NAVAL BASE IN ADRIATIC

FRENCH WAR SHIPS ARE BOMBARDING THE AUSTRIAN SEAPORTS—ENGLAND MAY BE AIDING.

London, Aug. 21.—Advice received here from a number of points indicate that every effort is being made to capture the Austrian seaports Cattaro and Dalmatians.

The forts at the entrance of the harbors have been bombarded for the past several days by the French war ships. The Montenegrin land forces with their artillery are assisting. Some dispatches state that the English fleet is also aiding in the bombardment.

#### JAPAN'S FLEET IS WAITING

FOR ORDERS TO ATTACK GERMAN YIP HER ULTIMATUM IS REFUSED—TIME EXPIRES SUNDAY NIGHT.

Tokyo, Aug. 21.—Only a complete breakdown of the Kaiser will prevent hostilities between Germany and Japan at Rajo Chau. So certain are the Japanese officials that there will be no favorable reply at the expiration of the Japanese ultimatum which occurs Sunday night next that the Japanese fleet is now already waiting near Shanghai for wireless orders.

#### MAIN ARMY IS EXPECTED

GERMAN DETACHMENT OF CAVALRY NOW OCCUPIES BRUSSELS—MAIN ARMY ARRIVES TODAY.

Rotterdam, Aug. 21.—Details of the German occupations of Brussels has been received here. The Burgomaster met detachments of the German cavalry who entered the city by the Louvain gate, carrying a white flag.

The German commander promised that if the inhabitants would offer no resistance that no harm would be inflicted upon the people nor the city. Only a detachment of the German cavalry is now occupying the city, but it is almost certain that the main German army will in all probability arrive today.

#### FRENCH STILL VICTORIOUS

STILL HOLDING ENTRENCHED POSITIONS ON THE UPPER ALSACE—STILL SHOW SUPERIORITY.

Paris, Aug. 21.—Reports officially have been given out to the effect that the French operations on the upper Alsace continue to be crowned with success. The enemy engaged the French forces between Mulhausen and Altkirch. Both of these places are held by the French who now hold a number of entrenched positions. There have been several brilliant bayonet charges and the superiority of the French forces was against demonstrated.

#### THE SERVIANS AGAIN VICTORS

INFLECTED HEAVY LOSS TO THE AUSTRIANS SUNDAY LAST. CAPTURED SIX FIELD GUNS.

#### CROWN PRINCE NOT WOUNDED

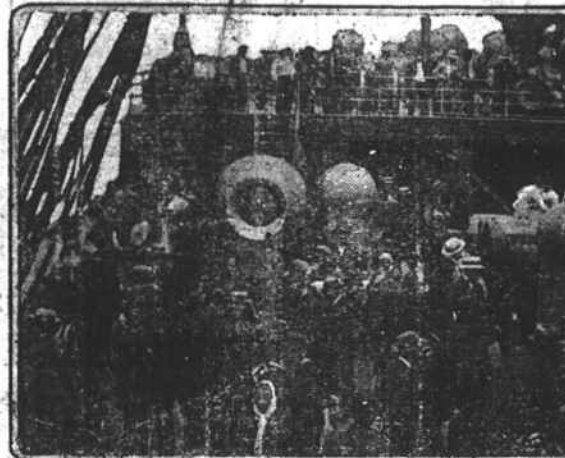
#### Will Indict The Boosters

#### N. C. Bankers Met In Raleigh

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF NATIONAL CURRENCY ASSOCIATION IN SESSION YESTERDAY.

#### ARMY SHIPS AT HAMPTON

TRANSPORTS WILL BE FITTED OUT FOR REFUGEES FROM EUROPE TO UNITED STATES.

Newport News, Va., Aug. 21.—Preceded by the chartered transport City of Denver, the United States army transport Sumner arrived yesterday from Galveston, Tex. Both she and the City of Denver went to the shipyard for repairs. The transport Kilpatrick is due late today and the City of Memphis and City of Macon, chartered Ward liners, are due tomorrow.

It was announced at the army quartermaster's depot here today that the vessels will be ready to leave within a week for Europe to bring home American refugees. The destinations of the transports have not yet been received here.

#### GREAT RACE IS ON TODAY

THE STARTER'S PISTOL SENT THE STAR AUTOMOBILE PHLOTS OFF IN RACES AT ELGIN, ILL.

Elgin, Ill., Aug. 21.—The starter's pistol sent the star automobile pilots of the country away today in the first of the annual races at Elgin track, the classic events in automobile circles in the middle West. The course lay over nearly nine miles of country roads through the greatest dairy country of the world and fringed by great crowds of spectators who swarmed into Elgin last night and early today from Chicago and surrounding cities. Around 36 laps the drivers will rush their cars for a total distance of 305.21 miles.

Today's event for the Chicago Automobile Club trophy and prizes worth about \$3,500 sent a field of noted drivers away, but the Elgin national trophy race tomorrow will attract the larger crowd though the prize money offered is about the same. Motor car traditions has placed the Elgin national as the big event in middle West racing and it has held the larger share of the interest from year to year.

Glenn Anderson, who won last year's Elgin national, was an entrant in today's race. He was one of the popular favorites. Anderson arrived here two weeks in advance of the race, established the Stutz camp and has engaged in daily workouts. Wishart and Pullen, the Mercedes stars (were other early arrivals this year.

Further improvement of the course this year has reduced the danger of accidents to a minimum. Course officials found last year that by eliminating the dangerous "hair-pin" turn they cut down the possibilities of serious accidents and they made other similar alterations this year. The course was entirely resurfaced; the turns were covered with crushed stone and rolled and so banked that only a slight lessening of speed will be necessary in taking the most dangerous curves.

#### BODY OF POPE PIUS X IN TEMPORARY TOMB

#### Thousands Viewed The Body Today

The story carried in the morning papers that Pope Pius' sister, Anna Sarto, was dead, is without foundation.

The body of Pope Pius X. was today viewed by the public for a period of six hours. The remains will be placed in a temporary tomb in St. Peter's Cathedral this afternoon.

Rome, Aug. 21.—Breaking all tradition and precedent, the body of Pope Pius X. will be taken from the Throne room in the Vatican and carried to St. Peter's in accordance with a desire expressed by the late Pontiff prior to his death.

The Pope said that he did not want his body to lie in the throne room where only the upper classes could see, but that he wanted to be placed in St. Peter's where both the rich and the poor likewise could come and view his body.

The matter of a conclave was discussed today. It is said that a majority of the Cardinals are in favor of holding it in Rome as is usual, and further because of the neutrality of Italy in the present war. Others suggested that it would be better if it were held in Holland.

Among the candidates already mentioned are Cardinals Maffi, DeLai, Ferrato, Agliardi, Pompili and Serafini, the last named ex-nuncio of Mexico. There is much interest in the matter of where the body of the Pope will find its final resting place.

It is recalled that the carrying of the body of Pope Pius IX. from St. Peter's to St. Lawrence caused a riot. For this reason the body of Pope Leo, although he had expressed a wish to be buried in St. John Lateran, where his tomb was erected, is still in St. Peter's as the late Pope feared that the transportation might cause disorders. It is believed that Pope Pius chose St. Peter's for his tomb in order to avoid unpleasantness. Cardinal Della Volpe, chamberlain of the Catholic Church, will be in charge of the Holy See temporarily. He will conduct the traditional ceremony in which the Pontiff is officially pronounced dead. The funeral ceremonies will consume nine days.

Cardinal Gibbons, of Baltimore, who is at Spring Lake, New York, was so shocked at the news of the Pope's death that he has been unable to prepare any statement. Seven hours after receiving the news of the death of Pope Pius Cardinal O'Connell, of Boston, started for Rome to attend the conclave, which elects a successor to Pope Pius.
