**A TREATY OF PEACE WITH NEARLY A BILLION PEOPLE**

The signing by Secretary Bryan and the respective Ambassadors of the treaties of peace with Great Britain, France, Spain and China marks the impressive culmination of a policy exemplified in practice by our course in Mexico. The common denominator of these treaties is the proviso that all disputes which the usual diplomatic offices fail to adjust shall be placed before a permanent committee of investigation during a period of a year.

This action is the effectual insurance of a lasting concord, with dignity and honor, between ourselves and countries whose population is at present, in round numbers, 945,000,000—nearly two-thirds of the total number of the earth's inhabitants. It is the answer to the qualms of those who feared that we might be drawn into controversy as a result of the general war abroad.

We could not, in sincerity, address petitions to the Most High for the prevalence of peace once more unless we were willing to do all that lies in human power to bring about that consummation. It is right to attribute a lasting significance to the concluding of these peace compacts, and to say of such, as President McKinley said of the Olney-Pauncefote arbitration treaty with Great Britain, that "the importance and moral influence of such a treaty can hardly be overestimated in the cause of advancing civilization."—Philadelphia Public Ledger (Ind. Rep.)
