"came into existence through the illegal votes of ignorant negroes, led by self-seeking aliens," as Dr. J. G. deR. Hamilton says. More than a fourth of the members were carpet-baggers and negroes. Shall we say that such a convention was better prepared to say what is best for the people of North Carolina fifty years later than the duly elected representatives of the people who submitted the present constitutional amendments last year?

WHO PREPARED THE AMENDMENTS?

For a commission on constitutional amendments the Legislature of 1913 picked from its membership a committee of its ablest and wisest men representing both political parties: E. L. Daughtrige, A. D. Ward, E. J. Justice, R. A. Daughton, A. T. Grant, Jr., A. D. Ivis, T. M. Washington, George W. Connor, R. L. Haymors, R. R. Williams, E. R. Wooten, Henry A. Page, W. A. Devin, H. W. Stubbs, and C. S. Wallace. Governor Craig added Dr. H. Q. Alexander, D. Y. Cooper, J. W. Bailey, A. M. Scales and N. J. House. This commission prepared fourteen amendments, but the Legislature reduced the number to the ten now offered.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS DO NOT INCREASE TAX RATE.

A number of men have been saying that it removes the restriction on the tax rate. As a matter of fact it says as distinctly as the English language can say a thing, that the present 66 2-3 cent limit on State and county taxes must continue; and what is more it fixes a limit on city taxes, where no limit has heretofore existed. The men who have said that the amendment left the Legislature free to run up tax rates were probably only ignorant, but in any case they have shown themselves to be men you can't trust for information and guidance about the amendments.

WHAT ARE THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS?

- The ten amendments, which the people of North Carolina are to vote for or against on November 3, are as follows:
1. To change the term "War of the Rebellion" where used to "War Between the States."
2. To increase the compensation of members of the General Assembly to \$360 per session, and decrease their mileage.
3. To limit local, private and special legislation by the General Assembly.
4. To change the day of inaugurating the Governor.
5. To prevent delays in trials by providing emergency judges.
6. Removing obsolete sections from the Constitution.
7. To revise and reform the system of revenue and taxation.
8. To prevent special charters to corporations by the General Assembly.
9. To prevent special charters to towns, cities and incorporated villages.
10. To require six months' public school term.
