For a commission on ional amendments the Legislatur of 1913 picked from its membership committee of its ablest and wises men representing both political par-ties; E. L. Daughtridge, A. D. Ward, E. J. Justice, R. A .Daughton, A. T. Grant, Jr., A. D. Ivie, T. M. Wash-ington, George W. Connor, R. L. Haymere, R. R. Williams, E. R. Wooten, Henry A. Page, W. A. Devin, H. W. Stubbs, and C. S. Wallace, Governor Craig added Dr. H. Q. Alexander, D. Y. Cooper, J. W. Balley, A. M. Scales and N. J. Rouse. This commission prepared tourteen amendments, but the Legislature reduced the number to the ten now offered.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS DO NOT INCREASE TAX RATE.

A number of men have been say ing that it removes the restriction on the tax rate. As a matter of fact it says as distinctly as the English language can say a thing, that the present 66 2-3 cent limit on State and county taxes must continue; and what is more it fixes a limit on city taxes, where no limit has heretofor existed.
