AMERICAN FASHIONS

TO BE WORN ON THE STAGE
Popular Marie Cahill, originator of the long-skirted chorus, will give practical help to the American fashion movement by wearing American designed and made gowns upon the stage. It has been a recognized fact that stage gowns are regarded as exhibits of the very latest fashions, and many theatre-goers adopt the costumes seen there to their own needs and wardrobes. Miss Cahill believes that American designers are ready for their present opportunity. "But," she says, "they must creep before they can walk. They should realize the necessity for going slowly. If the American 'hurry' germ gets into their systems artistry will be sacrificed for freakishness and their efforts will be ridiculed instead of praised. Our clothes must be artistic. We have taken all that Paris has sent us regardless of whether it was freakish or not, and I'd be the last person to say that all of the French fashions are admirable. We have given Paris to understand that only she could design clothes. The more frequently she changed styles the more often we bought. Why? The answer? She has outdone herself in attempting to create bizarre effects—this season's clothes had to be as different as possible from those in vogue last season. Which means that in order to keep up-to-date we had to change our wardrobe every time the weather changed. The amazing thing is that American designers have accomplished so much with so little encouragement. They have had to endure a slavish adoration of Paris that amounted to nothing less than snobishness."
The stage can do much to procure the cause of American fashions, said Miss Cahill, "for the stage is a factor in setting the styles. Women wear what they see worn, and my production I hope, in a small way, to encourage the American designer's efforts. I hope to show that the American designer can do if he is given half a chance."

AUTO PAGEANT FOR TRICENTENARY

New York, Oct. 25.—Three hundred years ago this month five Dutch ships returned to their home ports of Amsterdam and Hoorn and reported to the States General of the United Netherlands that over on the island of Manhattan they had built a trading station and begun trading with the natives for fur. That was twelve years before the first permanent settlement of New Amsterdam, but it marked the beginning of trade in festivals and pageants of various kinds in New York. To celebrate this event the city has been holding festivals and pageants of various kinds during the past month. The main features of this celebration will be two pageants one, of which the automobile pageant, will take place today. Governor Glynn, Mayor Mitchell, and other State and city officials, will participate. This auto pageant will be divided into separate divisions and classes which will include touring cars, runabouts, early models, grotesque and burlesque cars, advertising and motorcycles. A large number of women drivers have entered the decorated car division. Many prizes will be awarded to the victors in the several classes, including a solid gold cup, gold medals, bronzes, silver cups and cash prizes.
Governor Glynn, accompanied by his military staff, will lead the pageant, while Mayor Mitchell and visiting mayors of other cities with their official families will also take part. Other high officials who are expected to arrive in this city today and participate in its celebrations are Secretary of Commerce Redfield, Secretary of State Mitchell May, and General Nelson A. Miles. After the parade, a reception to Governor Glynn and Mayor Mitchell will be given by the Automobile Club of America.

LABOR NEWS AND NOTES

The carpenter's union in Holland has doubled its membership in five years.
Portuguese barbers are beginning to equip their shops with American chairs and other fixtures.
Chicago is about to establish a public library of 25,000 volumes in the continental languages of Europe for the benefit of its alien people.
There are fewer suicides among miners than among any other class of workmen. This has been proved by the aid of carefully compiled statistics.
The German Reichstag will be asked at its forthcoming session by the Trades Union League to pass a law compelling all employers to grant to women and girls a half holiday, beginning at 1 p. m. on Saturdays.
The Niagara county (New York) court has held constitutional the law requiring one day in seven for workers in manufacturing and mercantile establishments.
Money in Kangaroo Raising. In Australia kangaroo farming is an important industry. The hides are valuable, and the tendons are the best known to surgeons for sewing up wounds, and especially for holding broken bones together, being much stronger and tougher than catgut.

GEORGIA FEDERATION OF WOMEN'S CLUBS

Albany, Ga., Oct. 27.—The Georgia Federation of Women's Clubs is holding its annual three-day meeting in this city, commencing this evening with addresses of welcome by Mayor Tarver, by Mr. Mock, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, and Mrs. Holt, president of the local Woman's Club. Interesting features of the program will be the president's conference; the afternoon devoted to "Youth," and cotton day, on which will be held a cotton session. A miniature cotton exposition will be a unique and educational feature of the convention. On "Cotton Day" all the club women will wear cotton gowns. Mrs. N. Peterson, vice-president of the State Federation, will wear what is probably the first Georgia homespun dress which has been made in this State since the first decade after the war between the States. The dress is an original idea of Mrs. Peterson's. After some difficult she found an aged widow, Mrs. George Walker, living just outside of Tifton, Ga., who was willing to weave the cloth if a loom could be found. After a while a loom was found, and Supt. Shipp, of the Tifton Cotton Mills, spun the thread and made the warp. Mrs. Walker wove the cloth, and Mrs. Peterson will proudly wear the gown at this convention on "Cotton Day." It is of a rich cream color, embroidered with heavy cotton in an intricate design. Mrs. Peterson did the embroidering and made the entire gown herself.

OCTOBER 28TH IN HISTORY.

1844—The Royal Exchange at London opened in an imposing manner, the queen being present and presiding at the ceremony.
1848—Windischgratz, besieging the city of Vienna, entered the suburbs and began an attack; lasted several days before the city was completely mastered.
1854—The Turks in the principalities attacked the Russians, and after two hours contest compelled them to cross the Danube and destroy the bridges.
1864—General Grant reported the completion of a reconnaissance below Petersburg, giving an opportunity of operating on the enemy's flanks.
1886—Statue of Liberty unveiled.
1894—The Japanese reported to have blockaded Port Arthur, held by the Chinese, and to have landed considerable forces in the vicinity.
1904—Russo-Japanese war; Japanese reported to have captured forts on the three hills, less than three miles north of Port Arthur.
1910—The Portuguese government decreed the liberty of the press and the separation of Church and State.

RAILROAD NOTES

BRITAIN'S RAILROADS EMPLOY 400,000 MEN.
Electric railways in the United States employ 132,461 persons.
At Kansas City, which is the country's largest railroad center, there has been established a joint bureau for the collection of freight bills of all lines centering at that point.
The 5.1-3-mile double-track Canadian Pacific tunnel through the Selkirk mountains, which will be the longest in the Western Hemisphere, is to be electrified.
Canadian railroads have carried and are carrying a great amount of army supplies being rushed to Europe for use of the allied armies. For convenient distribution the shipments were made to seven ports, Liverpool and London getting the largest consignments.
The Southern Railway and affiliated lines have made educational exhibits at nine State and general fairs, and 21 county fairs in Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia.

Weeding out of inconsistencies in the western freight and passenger rate structure, applying advice extended by the interstate commerce commission to the railways as to the manner in which they meet, at least partially, the difficulties arising from declining earnings and advancing expenses, is the aim of the proposed rectification of tariffs in western territory served by roads operating west of Chicago, St. Louis and the Mississippi.

STUDENT ARTISTS' SHOW.

Boston, Mass., Oct. 28.—To give an opportunity to students to show their work in a gallery, Doll & Richards have today opened an exhibition here, which will continue through three weeks. Many of the younger artists in the schools, doing a really professional work, are unacquainted with the methods of presenting their work to the public, or handicapped by lack of means to exhibit in the usual way. To meet these conditions, this exhibition is being given, and it is hoped by the promoters that sufficient interest will be shown to warrant making the affair a yearly occurrence.
