## AROMATIC WEEDS AND FEED TAIN T MILK



Pure Wholesome Milk Comes From Sound, Healthy Cows Only—A Fact Herd.

If weeds are allowed to grow in the fields they will, in a great many ways, depreciate the value of farm products.

During the season of the year when the grass is short, cows should not be allowed to feed upon pastures where noxious weeds, such as amaranth, milkweeds, poppies, mandrake, skunk cabbage, and ragweed grow.

Neither should these weeds be left to grow in meadows and grain fields where they are cut with the hay and grain to be fed to cattle. A few hours spent in cutting and destroying weeds is time well spent.

Cattle will eat the foliage of these plants at any time of the year, but are more likely to feed upon them when the grass in the pasture is short.

A stream of pure, clear water comes, beyond a doubt, from a pure source. In a like manner it may be said that healthy well-fed cows produce pure, wholesome milk.

It is too broad a statement to say that pure, wholesome milk comes from sound, healthy cows only, and that impure, unwholesome milk is produced by unsound, unhealthy cows?

It is not my intention to go into a discussion of the diseases common among cattle, but to emphasize how easily the milk of the cows is tainted through their food.

### MILLS HAVE RESUMED FULL TIME OPERATIONS

Yonkers, N. Y., Nov. 14.—The mills of the Alexander Smith & Sons Carpet Co., the biggest industry of the city, have resumed operations on full time, after running only three days a week since August 6. Seven thousand hands are employed. The company recently held a successful auction sale of rugs and carpets in New York city, and this coupled with ability to get sufficient dyes, resulted in a return to the normal schedule of work.

## Came Near Death's Door Yesterday

H. Williams, who is employed by the Blount Electrical Company, came near meeting with death yesterday afternoon, and while his condition today is favorable he is still in a precarious condition.

While engaged at work on a pole yesterday afternoon at the foot of East Main street, wiring to the dairy of Mr. W. T. Hudnell, he came in contact with a live wire and the consequence that 2,800 volts passed through his body. He was knocked senseless and in falling to the ground fell into a ditch containing about two feet of water. Mr. Blount seeing the accident rushed to the unfortunate man and applied artificial respiration. After hard work he was made to breathe and by the time Dr. John G. Blount arrived on the scene was living. He was carried to the Fowle Memorial Hospital. His condition today is much better.

### CHINA IS BEING RAPIDLY UNIFIED AND STRENGTHENED

New York, Nov. 14.—As the war area in the Orient spreads about the Chinese republic reports arrive which indicate that China is being rapidly unified and strengthened by a wave of patriotism for the new government. It would appear that China is gathering her forces to resist the menace of the world war. It is very likely an agreement will be reached between the Chinese radical leaders, and the President and government of China. The leaders feel that personal differences should be obliterated in face of the present international situation and the necessity of Chinese national unity as an essential aid to the preservation of Chinese national integrity.

### GERMAN AGENTS SEEKING COMMODITIES

Geneva, Nov. 14.—It has been reported by reliable sources, that German agents are trying to buy lead, copper, leather, canned goods and motors, for both aeroplanes and submarines. In Switzerland and Italy they are offering high prices for these commodities. Both countries mentioned have already prohibited the exportation of some of these articles and further measures are being adopted.

### ORDER PLACED FOR 50,000 DOZEN HOSPITAL SHIRTS

Reading, Pa., Nov. 14.—An order has been received from the English government for 50,000 dozen hospital shirts for the British army. S. Lieberwitz & Sons, who received this order have been informed that if the first shipments are satisfactory, the government will place orders for 150,000 dozen more. The contract will keep the mill in full operation for months and the order means payment to this firm of \$350,000.
