MR. WOOLLEN.

In the election of Bennett H. Woollen as Speaker of the House of Representatives for the session of 1917, an honor has been conferred upon him that has never before been held by any member of the House of his age. And it is one that no member would be proud to have given them.

Mr. Woollen is still a young man, being only thirty-six years of age. He was born at Fort Barnwell, Craven county, and is the son of John C. and Mary (Cobb) Woollen, graduated in law and was admitted to the North Carolina bar in 1900.

He served well the city of Kinston as city attorney and Lenoir county as county attorney for a number of years and is a trustee of the University of North Carolina. Was Representative in the General Assembly in 1909 and 1911, and is a prominent member of a number of fraternal orders.

In assuming the speakership Mr. Woollen expressed in fervent manner his appreciation of the honor, and for the fullest co-operation of members and declared his purpose to be to do all possible things to be assisted by the House committee as well as on the floor in the work of legislation so that some good may be done and the dignity of the House maintained.

"You having elected me as president of this branch of the national assembly of North Carolina," said Mr. Woollen, "permit me to express to you my profound gratitude and sincere appreciation for the confidence and trust you have this morning exhibited and reposed in me."

"It is not my purpose or desire on this occasion to attempt to trespass upon the functions that are yours in referring to matters which demand serious consideration and most mature thoughts as servants of the people. As your presiding officer, fellow members of the House, I petition you for your consent, assistance and co-operation, without which my energies and efforts as speaker will be futile. It will not be the great number of laws that we place on the statute books which will make this session of the General Assembly memorable, but the class and character of legislation that we enact and which is adopted by this body. Therefore, I hope when this session shall have come to a close and we turn our backs upon the doors of this chamber, the citizenship of the state of North Carolina may truthfully say 'Well done, thou good and faithful servant.'"
