SUMMARY OF THE LATEST WAR NEWS

Another important victory over the Russians was announced today by the German press in the capture of the Polish town of Praszyn. The heaviest fighting in Northern Poland since the capture of the Russians from East Prussia occurred in the vicinity of this town. It is said to have resulted in the capture of more than 10,000 Russians. Petrograd has not confirmed this report.

The French and German official communications today indicate that the calm on the western front is unbroken. French attacks in Champagne continue without important results.

A declaration in the House of Commons by Sir Edward Grey constituted perhaps the most important political development since the war began. The foreign secretary announced that Great Britain was in sympathy with Russia's aspirations for access to the sea. He referred to Russia's hope of obtaining Constantinople as a result of the war with Turkey.

The second week of Germany's submarine campaign opened today with the loss of two more British ships. The steamers Western Coast and Deptford were sunk off the English coast, either by mines or torpedoes.

Germany apparently is preparing to extend the field of these operations, for three submarines have been sent to Pola, presumably for use in the Adriatic and Mediterranean.

The American proposals for cessation of this form of warfare and admission of foodstuffs to Germany are before the German and British governments, but there are no indications as they will find acceptance.

Germany's claim to an overwhelming victory in East Prussia, resulting in the virtual annihilation of the Russian tenth army, is denied categorically by the Russian general staff. The admission is made that two army corps are said to have escaped from the German surrounding movement. Efforts of the Germans to clinch their victory by striking a decisive blow in Northern Poland are leading to continuous battles all along that section of the front, the outcome of which the Russian staff does not attempt to forecast.

Hardly less intense is the campaign in the Carpathians. Petrograd claims successes in small engagements. Despatches from the front to Swiss newspapers say the Russians are winning consistently, and that the Austrians have lost more than 3,000 men at Dukla pass.

REPORT OF COUNTY HOME WORK YEAR OF NINETEEN FOURTEEN

The evangelistic work at the County Home has been conducted throughout the year (with just a little change) as in the past. Services were held at the Home every third Sunday afternoon. Every appointment has been filled, and that was owing to the amenability of the weather.

Mr. J. J. Davis is now superintendent of the Home, which is kept in good condition, and the inmates comfortable.

There are 18 inmates, 8 white and 10 colored.

Nine persons died at the Home during the year, 8 white and 1 colored.

On January the 18th, Rev. E. L. Gay, the new Baptist minister, preached his first sermon at the Home, and there was a large attendance.

Rev. H. B. Starlight preached on February 15th.

March 18th, Rev. A. D. Wilson, a visiting minister, preached for Rev. E. M. Gupton, the new Methodist minister.

Of whatever church an inmate is a member, we always get their pastor to conduct the funeral.

On April 13th Rev. J. V. Hope, conducted the funeral service over the remains of Mrs. Daniels. April 19th he also preached at the Home.

On May 17th a very interesting and entertaining service was conducted under the auspices of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. Misses Annie Mae Harmon and Gladys Allgood, with their violin, assisted in the music. There were fifteen members of the Union present and a number of visitors. A fine program was carried out and service proved to be very enjoyable.

On May 24th Rev. R. V. Hope conducted the funeral service of Mr. Gabe Garganus.

On May 19th Mr. George Edwards, a Confederate soldier, died, and was buried by his people in the cemetery and the interment was made in the family burying ground.

On June 25th, Mr. W. B. Harding conducted service. There was a large attendance and the music was by his brother, Mr. Edmund Harding, presided at the organ.

On July 8th, Mr. Jim Weathers, the blind inmate, died. His funeral service was conducted by Rev. J. V. Hope, who also assisted in taking him to the grave and filling it up, as there were not enough present to perform the solemn service.

The burial of God's poor is the saddest of all the work. As I gaze on the soot stained faces of the sad poor, "Dear God, be gentle over the stones, for he is a father that His maker yet owns."

The Methodist Missionary Society held service August 16th. Religion, prose and poems were read by the members. Good prayers were offered with appropriate hymns and beautiful duets. At the close of the meeting pictured magazines were given to all the inmates. The meeting was helpful and comforting and we all felt better for the little service rendered.

September 13th Rev. E. M. Gupton conducted the funeral service over the remains of Miss Alpha Waters; at the cemetery. She was buried in the Methodist plot. Many members of the W. C. T. U. attended the funeral and covered her grave with flowers.

September 20th was the day of the Laymen's meeting. Mr. John B. Sparrow, of the Presbyterian church, led the meeting; assisted by Mr. C. G. Morris, Methodist, and Mr. Lee Stewart, Presbyterians.

The Episcopal, Baptist and Christian laymen were not present on account of sickness and other causes, which we regret, as we wished to have each church represented.

October 9th Miss Mary Edwards died and was carried to Chocowinity and buried beside her brother.

Mrs. Leona and Miss Rumbley, who were so faithful in carrying the money from the church societies, which gives the white inmates twenty-five cents each per month, resigned and Mrs. E. T. Stewart was made treasurer of the County Home fund. She collects and takes the money to them each month.

Dr. John Blount is county physician. We learn that he is kind and attentive.
