THE HISTORY OF MAN
BY DR. H. H. HAY

There is a general feeling of concern
over a single and definite disease, as dis-
tinct and uniform in its nature and
symptoms as appendicitis or typhoid
fever. It is nearer the truth to re-
gard "cancer" as the name of a
group of quite different diseases
which have one feature in common.
It has been said that the layman's
conception of cancer is of something
very definite, very portentous, quite
hopeless, a disease which always af-
fects someone else than himself, and
about which he carried no immedi-
ate interest or responsibility. If
this is a fair statement the layman
is wrong on practically every count,
and his error and confusion is prob-
ably due, in no small part, to the
failure to take account of the many
forms of cancer. If this were done
perhaps the patient would not so
frequently yield to despair and
throw away the excellent chance of
cure that exists when the disease
is first discovered.

As a matter of fact "cancer" in
the light of modern knowledge of
human ailments, is almost as gen-
eral and vague a term as "fever."
The word covers a number of en-
tirely distinct diseases, differing
widely in their origin, symptoms,
treatment and curability. The vari-
ous kinds of tumors have little in
common except that they are all
forms of new and lawless growths
of body cells.

This false notion of cancer as a
single disease has probably hindered
progress toward the understand-
ing and control of the various dis-
eases which are conveniently group-
ed under that term. All forms of
cancer are aspects of new and law-
less cell growth and it is the law-
lessness of such growth that makes
it so dangerous.

The essential point for the man in
the street is that each different kind
of cancer is a separate disease. If
he knows this he is better equipped
to handle it. It would be
well before becoming discouraged
to go and find out which form he

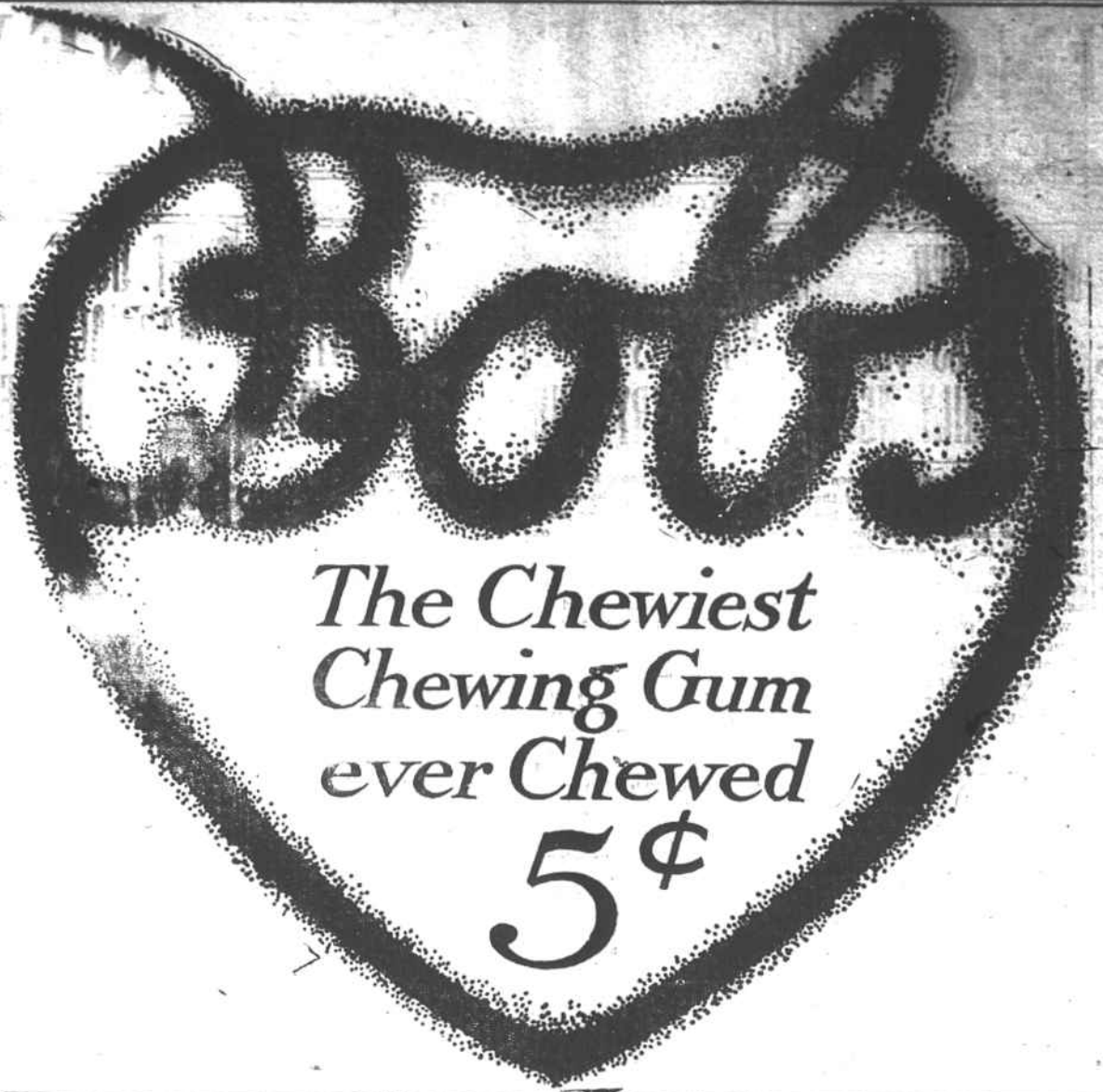
