The North Carolina State emmission Thursday made public the list of apointments of county tax assesors, this under the new machinery act adopted by the last legislaturė. Geo. E. Ricks was nam ed Essessor for Beaufort county.

The county assessors will hold of fice during the period of listing, assessing and equalizing the real and personal property for the year 1915. The compensation will be four dol-lars per day while the assessor is actually engaged in the performance of his duties.

The county assesor will have an assistant in each township, and, if needed, two assistants. The assistants will be named by the county mmissioners, who may in the case of towns and cities appoint as assistant assessor for each ward. The fi nal authority in the matter of equal teation will remain, as now, with the loard of Commissioners.


