KEEPING HUSBANDS ON JOB.

The Chicago Bureau of Public
Welfare, after an investigation into
the causes for husbands deserting
their wives announces that "Next
to steady employment, plenty of
children seem undoubtedly to be the
best possible guarantee of marital
permanence and solidarity." Or in
plain English, when women have
plenty of children, their husbands
don't run away. This truth may be
taken into account by the steadily
growing number of women who
"don't want to be bothered with ba-
bies."

Among the other best bets for
keeping husbands on their husband-
ing job are these:

The wife should be big and
strong (there the tradition of chiv-
alic devotion to the "little wife"
and the "weaker sex" goes elim-
inating.)

The wife should be a good cook.
She should be good natured.

Thus we have a formula that
makes it fairly easy for a man to
pick out a wife to whom he'll want
to stay married. The girl in the
case should be healthy, domes-
tically an above all, eager for
children. Any woman who lacks
these qualifications should do her
best to develop them.

The bureau fails to provide women
with any such handy rule for
picking out husbands. The best
it can do is that respect appar-
ently, is to assure them that a la-
boring man—if he has steady work
—is far more likely to stay married
and support his family than a man
earning a big salary.

As for husbands figuring out how
to keep wives on the job, nothing
is said about that. Wives are not
so much given to running away from
their homes. Desertion is a peculiarly
masculine practice.
