"LEAVE FRANK TO GEORGIA" SAYS GAY

PASTOR SAYS THAT OUTSIDE WORLD SHOULD NOT INTERFERE

TALKS OF CASE

States That All of the Local Pastors Did Not Sign Petition to Governor of Georgia.

That the case against Leo M. Frank, charged with the murder of Mary Phagan, should be left to Georgia and Georgia alone to decide, was the statement made this morning by Rev. H. B. Gay, pastor of the First Baptist church of this city. Mr. Gay, in an interview with a Daily News representative, stated that whoever gave out the information that practically all the pastors of the city had signed the petition, recently sent from Washington to the governor of Georgia, was mistaken. He added that he had not signed it and that he had conferred with Rev. H. B. Seagriff, pastor of the Presbyterian church, and the latter stated that he also had not affixed his signature to the document.

"In announcing the fact that a largely signed petition had been sent from here for the commutation of the sentence of Leo Frank," said Mr. Gay, "you say that it was signed by the local pastors, leaving the impression that it was signed by all the pastors. Permit me to say that, at least, two of the pastors did not sign it. I suspect, if the truth was known, a majority of the signers of these petitions know little or nothing of the merits of the case. It is certainly safe to assume that the twelve men who convicted Frank, the judge who sentenced him and the courts that have reviewed the case know more about it than those whose only information was received from newspaper reports. It is to be hoped that the Pardoning Board of the great state of Georgia are men of sufficient intelligence to decide this case on its own merits and that they will not allow themselves to be influenced by outside parties who have nothing to do with the case."

"I wonder why so many people are anxious to shield criminals from the consequences of their crimes? Since the multitude clamored for the release of Barabara there have always been people ready to lend sympathy and assistance to the vile criminals, especially if the crime had wealth or social prominence. Protection of criminals produces crime and the most effective prevention of crime is the punishment of criminals without respect of persons. On this subject Judge Carter is everlastingly right. May his tribe increase."

WANTS TRIAL BY JURY FOR CLIENTS

CASE AGAINST SCOTT AND BERGERON BROUGHT UP YESTERDAY

TRIAL ON FRIDAY

Spends Through Into Court and Final Right's Case Set for Later Part of Week.

The case against Scott & Bergeron, charged with having in their possession a larger amount of liquor than the law allows, was brought up in the recorder's court yesterday afternoon. The police entered the store, owned by the above men, last week and discovered 17 pints of whiskey.

W. C. Hodman, attorney for the defendants, demanded a trial by jury, for his clients. The case will be brought up on Friday afternoon.

Harry Feeds, charged with speeding his automobile, was fined costs of court.

William White, charged with riding his motorcycle at a swifter gait than the law allows, received a similar decision.

Josephine White, colored, charged with disorderly conduct, was fined by the court. Being unable to pay the fine, she was sentenced to ten days in jail.

The case against H. W. Right, colored, charged with having 60 pints of liquor shipped to him, will not be brought up in court until the latter part of this week, owing to the absence of his attorney from the city.

JIM BAUGHAM RELEASED AT NEW BERN

COURT DECIDES THAT KILLING OF CHILD WAS AN ACCIDENT

NO TRIAL HELD

Case Was Thrown Out of Court Yesterday Afternoon by Judge George W. Connor.

The case against James Baugham of this city, which was tried yesterday in the Superior court in session at New Bern, was thrown out of court by Judge George W. Connor. Mr. Baugham was charged with reckless driving which resulted in the death of James Ringold, a child. Judge Connor held that the affair was purely an accident in which Baugham was in no way to blame. A motion was entered by Solicitor Abernethy for the expunging of the records made on the Superior court records by Judge Carter and which reflected upon his official and personal character. Judge Connor announced that he would set aside the records. The general opinion is that it will be stricken off.

The news of Mr. Baugham's release from the charge held against him, was received with considerable satisfaction by his many friends in Washington. He is one of the most popular young men of the city and no one regretted the accidental killing of the child more than he or his family. All reparations possible has been made to the Ringold family. The father of the child sent a note to court yesterday, stating that he believed the affair was an accident and that he wished to withdraw his prosecution.

TOMBSTONE DATED 1816 IS FOUND

STONE WAS UNEARTHED IN THE REAR OF OLD FOWLE HOME

IS IN GOOD SHAPE

In Memory of Mrs. Fanny Holland, Who Died in this City in the Year of 1816.

The men engaged in tearing down the old Fowle home on Main street yesterday unearthed an old tombstone in the rear of the house, which was buried deep in the ground. No grave was found and it is believed that the tombstone had been brought from its original location at the cemetery and moved to where it was found.

The inscription on the stone read as follows:

In Memory of MRS. FANNY HOLLAND The late consort of Mr. John Holland, Merchant of the town of Washington, Who departed this life on the 4th of August, 1816. Aged 71 years.

She was a loving and affectionate wife, a kind mistress, charitable to the needy and the loss of her was much regretted by all of her friends and acquaintances.

Inquiries regarding the identity of John Holland were made this morning of some of the prominent residents of the city, but nothing appears to be known of the Holland family here.

CABINET ACTS ON WEIGHTY MATTERS

DISCUSSING INTERNATIONAL QUESTIONS AT MEETING TODAY

TO ACT ON NOTE

Will Decide Answer to be Sent to Germany. Take Up Affairs in Mexico.

Washington, D. C., June 1.—At the meeting of the cabinet today, President Wilson will bring up two questions of importance: the reply that is to be sent in answer to Germany's note and the attitude that this country will regard to Mexico.

It is believed that the cabinet will be dispatched before the end of the week. No hint as to its nature has been given, but it is generally stated that the communication will be brief and to the point, demanding immediate action by the German government.

The note to Mexico, it is claimed, will request that that nation warfare within its boundaries. Should no action be taken, the United States will find other means to save the interests of non-combatants who are suffering as a result of the perpetual conflict.

THE NEW YORK PRESS COMMENTS ON GERMANY'S NOTE

General Sentiment is That it Evades Issues. German Paper Defends It.

New York Times.—The German reply is not responsive to our demand. It does not promise that "clear and full understanding" as to a grave situation which President Wilson in his note declared to be desirable.

New York World.—The German note in response to the American protest against submarine attacks upon merchantmen does not meet the issue. It is worse than evasive. It is insincere, even pettifogging.

New York Tribune.—Germany's answer to our government's protest against the slaughter of its citizens, peacefully and lawfully going about their business on the high seas, will not satisfy American opinion. It does not strike the note which the people of this country hoped that it would strike.

New York Press.—Berlin's answer to President Wilson's note is friendly, gracious, and unsatisfactory.

New York Herald.—Germany has ignored the real issue presented by the American note of May 13. As was clearly set forth in that historic document the attitude of the United States is not based upon any one of the series of the events cited, but upon the principle involved in the method of warfare in which they were incidents.

New Yorker (New York) Herald.—The reply of the German government shows conclusively that Germany is most anxious to live at peace with America. That she desires to be shown where she is wrong is but natural, and we think fair-minded men will concede that with the vessel being carried on the navy list as an auxiliary cruiser the presumption is strong that German submarine officers thought her armed and ready to offer resistance.

ROUT TURKS IN FIERCE BATTLE

LOST AT LEAST 2,000 MEN; BRITISH LOSS WAS ONLY 300.

130 BOATS SUNK

Statement by British Officials Show That Number Destroyed Since Beginning of War.

London, June 1.—Heavy fighting on Gallipoli peninsula, resulting in the rout of the attacking Turkish forces, is announced in an official statement given out today. The casualties of the Turks are said to have amounted to at least 2,000. British losses are given as 300.

Battle at Przemysl. Berlin, June 1.—No new developments have occurred since yesterday. The struggle for Przemysl still continues. No serious engagements are reported in the eastern theatre of war.

Success for Russians. Petrograd, June 1.—The battle on the San in the vicinity of Przemysl is developing in favor of the Russians, according to an official announcement given out today. The Russians, between May 13 and May 24, captured nearly 19,000 of their antagonists.

130 Vessels Sunk. London, June 1.—An admiralty statement, giving the number of British merchant and fighting vessels sunk or captured since the beginning of the war, shows that 59 merchantmen have been sent to the bottom by cruisers of the enemy, 12 by mines and 62 by submarines, a total of 130.

Sink Two More. London, June 1.—German submarines Saturday torpedoed the British steamer, Dixiana. The entire crew was saved. The Danish steamer, Soberg, has also been sunk in the English channel. The crew was saved.

Mr. and Mrs. Upham have left for Annapolis, where they will attend the commencement exercises.
