NOTICE.

To the Fishermen and Others Interested in the Fishing Industry of North Carolina.

At a meeting of the Fisheries Commission Board, held in Washington, N. C., on April 29th and 30th, 1915, a full membership of the Board being present, the following orders were passed: First. It was ordered that until January 1st, 1916, for experimental purposes, Ocean pound-nets be allowed to extend to 200 yards of the shore, said nets not to be placed within three (3) miles of either side of any inlet and within one (1) mile of either side of Cape Lookout Bight.

Second. That the fishing of round nets shall be prohibited in the waters of Albemarle Sound and its tributaries from June 1st until January 1st. Third. That no net smaller than 1-2 inch bar before tarring shall be fished in the waters of North Carolina, provided that this shall not apply to nets fished exclusively for shrimps and men-haden. Provided further that skin and cast nets only shall be used for the catching of shrimps in Pender, New Hanover and Brunswick counties.

Fourth. Ordered that the board will meet in Edenton June 8th, then at the other principal fishing points to hear any complaints, etc., against the above ruling from the fishermen of the State, the full time to be left with Messrs. Gibbs and Webb. The Fish Commissioner was ordered to notify the fishermen of the State of the ruling of the Fisheries Commission Board, the time, place and purposes of meeting, notices to be published in such papers as are necessary and circular letters.

C., from 10 a. m., till 1 p. m., and from 2:30 p. m., till 5 p. m., at the Courthouse. Friday, June 11, Morehead City, N. C., from 10 a. m., till 1 p. m., at the Red Men's hall. Saturday, June 12, Wilmington, N. C., from 2 p. m., till 6 p. m., at the Courthouse.
