DEVELOPMENT OF TAR RIVER IS DISCUSSED

TARBORO 'ALUMNI' TO LAUNCH A MOVIE FOR A 30000 CHANNEL. COST \$800,000

Master as to taking up with Com. ... (Special to the Daily News) ... Tarboro, Aug. 14.—With the visit to Tarboro last week of Democratic House Leader Claude Mitchell, it is the plan of the Board of Aldermen and the Chamber of Commerce in that town to launch one of the biggest development projects attempted for this section in many years.

These findings are the result of a survey made by Government Engineer Brown, in compliance with an order from the Secretary of War in 1911, and his recommendations embrace an offer from the towns of Tarboro and Greenville to each care for one per cent of the outlay for the total work, which would cost \$800,000. This \$16,000 is embraced in consideration of the power service afforded through the operation of the lock.

SAW MILL DESTROYED BY FIRE

Williamston, Aug. 14.—While the crew at the mill of Coltrain Bros. were at dinner, flames were started by sparks from the boiler, and the entire plant with all lumber on the yard, log cars, etc., was destroyed.

The loss is estimated to be about \$2,500.00, and as there was no insurance, the plant was a total loss to owners. The protracted spell of dry weather made the material burn more readily, and there being no one on the yard to note the beginning, the fire had too much headway when discovered.

TEXANS ASK GOVERNMENT FOR RIFLES

ARMS AND AMMUNITION NEEDED TO REPRESS THE UPRISING OF MEXICANS ON THE BORDER. HOLD MEETING

Brownsville, Texas, Aug. 14.—Although a few depredations by bands of Mexican raiders were reported here in the last twenty-four hours, authorities in the lower Rio Grande valley continued today to take measures to suppress the lawlessness that almost had brought about a reign of terror in this section.

Developments in this matter were expected to follow the conference which was to be held at Rockport, Texas, where Governor Ferguson is spending his vacation. Besides the Governor, Adjutant General Hutchings, John N. Garner, Congressman from Texas, and other prominent citizens of the State were to discuss the border situation.
