TO GET VIEW OF BANKERS IN THE WEST

New York, Sept. 28.—Having reached a virtual agreement with bankers of the eastern section of the country over the detail of the proposed half billion dollar credit loan to Great Britain and France, members of the Anglo-French Financial Commission, accompanied by a member of the firm of J. P. Morgan & Co., have arranged to leave this afternoon for Chicago. According to one prominent banker identified with the negotiations, adoption of the tentative program by the bankers of the west and middle-west assured its final adoption in its present state. With all parties acquiescing, ratification of the agreement will be sought from the British and French governments. At the same time virtually all the bankers of the country would be asked to participate in floating the loan, a syndicate of prominent financiers conducting in their behalf, the negotiations with the commission.

FIRING SQUAD TO EXECUTE MURDERER

Salt Lake City, Utah, Sept. 28.—Joseph Hillstrom will be put to death by shooting October 1, in accordance with the sentence of the court, Governor William Spry today notified the State Department at Washington.

A telegram of the Swedish Minister, W. A. F. Ekengren, addressed to the State Department and forwarded to Governor Spry, suggested that delay might be advisable because of protests that Hillstrom had not had a fair trial. The telegram sent by Governor Spry after a meeting of the Board of Pardons, asserted that the trial had been fair and every opportunity extended Hillstrom to prove his innocence. Hillstrom was convicted of killing J. C. Morrison, a grocer, and his 15-year-old son.
