**LENOIR AFTER
A HOSPITAL**

May Call Election to Issue \$50,000
Bonds for a County Hospital.

Petition Signed by Many.

(By Eastern Press)

Kinston, Oct. 5.—A petition was
presented to the Board of County
Commissioners today by physicians
of the county, asking for an election
for \$50,000 in 21-year bonds for the
building and the equipment of a
county hospital. Several doctors
circulated the petition, and secured
the necessary number of signers,
Drs. H. O. Hyatt and F. A. Whitaker
presented the petition to the Com-
missioners. It bore 250 names,
while 200, 150 of them outside the
town in which it is intended to
locate the hospital, were all that
were necessary. No opposition is
anticipated by the movement's
friends. The enabling act makes it
mandatory upon the Commissioners
to call the election after 200 signa-
tures have been secured. The Board
will name the date later.
