### NOT TIME FOR PEACE.

It will probably be a good thing for the world in general that Henry Ford failed in his peace mission. It is to be hoped that everyone else, who tries to ring the warring nations of Europe to peace at the present time will fail. Europe is in no condition for peace. If Ford's plan had worked out, it would have brought about a false peace. It would be a thing of patches, a mere armed true deciding nothing and providing a more period of recuperation after which the nations would be at each others' throats again.

What Ford and so many other well-intending pacifists fail to un derstand is that the war is not an aimless Killkenny riot, nor an international battle-ropal for a material prize, but that Europe is fight ing for principles. And there can be no durable and satisfying peace until the issue is determined one way or the other, by dint of blood and treasure, so decisively that it will not have to come to arbitra ment again.

The issue is as clear in Europe as ours was in our civil war. Then we settled for sood the question whether slavery should continue to exist in America. Europe, we trust, if let alone, will settle for good the question whether nations may still go forth and take what they want from their neighbors by force, or whether there shall be no conquest except by peaceful methods in honest competition,

It has been said that this is a war of autocracy against democracy. And so it is, in a way. That is to say, there is more autocracy on one side, and more democracy on the other. But the big dominant question is simply this—whether a nation, any more than an individual, may arm to the teeth and go out and "shoot up" a civilized community and take and ke p whatever real estate and personality is happens to want.

And if the war is allowed to run its course, Europe will probably emerge able to live an orderly, civilized existence hereafter, without any outlawry and gun-toting.

For several months after the war started, rumors were current to the effect that she would join one side or the other. These rumors proved without foundation and the country is still at peace.

Now, however, another report is brought forward, which might be taken as an indication that Spain is about to enter the war. She is alleged to have purchased several million rounds of ammunition in New York and to have established a thirty million credit loan for other municious. It is believed she may be preparing to enter the tugal.

Spain has no principle to fight for and is evidently going to enter the war-if she enters it at all-for the gain that it will be to her. Those who are in touch with national affairs of the Spaniards, claim that the only reason why that country is not already engaged in warfare is because the inducements have not been big enough.

Spain is in a class with Turkey, Bulgaria and the other countrie of Europe of the lower type and she will probably join forces with them before the war is over.
