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PROSPERITY RETURNS TO THE SOUTH; TOBACCO SALES SHOW IT

There are many signs of returning prosperity throughout the Southern States. Southerners have more money to spend, and are spending it, which is one of the surest signs. When the smokers of the South start in buying more tobacco, month after month, it is a pretty sure indication that they have more money to spend each month.
