NEW PRESIDENT.

The election of Professor W. C. Riddick to the presidency of the A. and M. College, Raleigh, by the Board of Trustees was the right thing. He was elected last week to succeed Dr. D. H. Hill, who resigned the presidency some time ago.

The new president is fifty-two years old and a native of Wake county. He has been connected with the college for more than twenty years, occupying the chair of engineering and it was entirely fitting that he should be made the head of this well known state institution of learning.

That the Agricultural and Mechanical College will continue to go forward and render greater and greater service to the young manhood of North Carolina as the years go on, goes without saying among those who know anything of the ability of the new president. President Riddick is popular with the people of his county and, too, the students that have done work under him for the last twenty years. The college is to be congratulated.

ONLY RETURN TO OFFICE.

The Republican party today finds itself in the predicament of not standing for anything in particular except a return to office. Altogether this party stands for very little except a hope that the president will hang himself in popular favor in such a way that it can ride into office on his unpopularity.

A party that seriously considers a candidate like Hughes, when his beliefs on the vital questions of the day are unknown, very evidently has no very firm convictions of its own.

The fundamental principles which the republican party formulated for the campaign have depended right up to the last upon the actions of the President. The Republican party as a whole has not had the courage to make any set of principles the campaign issue. It is a very badly divided party without much real leadership and it without a constructive program.

The Democratic party in 1912 nominated a man of leadership and ability who gained the public confidence, won the election, and made his party into a working organism. Again this year Mr. Wilson will lead a united Democratic party to victory.

BEAUFORT CO. REPUBLICANS

Hold Their Nomination Convention in Washington, N. C. July 4, 1916. A New Declaration of Independence, Says Chairman Paul.

By order of Republican County Executive Committee, the Republican convention is called to meet in Washington July 4 at 11 o'clock for the purpose of nominating a county ticket and candidate for House of Representatives and such other business as may come before the convention. The precinct committee will call the Republicans in their precincts together and elect their delegates to the county convention.

The precinct committee will hold their primary Saturday, June 31st, at 11 o'clock, except Belhaven, Washington Park and the four wards in Washington. These will hold their primaries on Friday night, June 30th. The Hon. Frank A. Linney, Republican nominee for Governor, is expected to be with us July 4. Mr. Linney has no superior in North Carolina as a debater. Every voter in Beaufort county should hear him.

CRAB CRUISE MIDSHIPMEN BILLED FOR TODAY

(By United Press) Annapolis, Md., June 5.—Today began the practice cruise for midshipmen along the Atlantic coast, a "crab cruise," as the Academy vernacular has it. The squadron left Annapolis this morning and is scheduled to arrive at Culebra on June 12. It will leave Culebra on June 17 and arrive at Guantanamo on June 21. It will stay at Guantanamo until July 6, and the next stop will be Provincetown, Mass., which, it is expected, will be reached on July 13, and which will become the squadron base.

The vessels of the squadron will then separate to rendezvous on August 7 and leave Provincetown one week later. August 18 to 21, will be spent at Hampton Roads and August 21 to 27 at the Southern drill grounds. The squadron will arrive off the Patuxent River, in the Chesapeake Bay, on August 29 and at Annapolis on August 30. The midshipmen will then go on leave for a month. The ships of the squadron will stop at points after reaching Provincetown as follows: The Missouri, Portland; the Rockport, Boston; the Wisconsin, Portland; the Boston, Gloucester; the Ohio, Boston; the Rockport, Salem.
