first time in history, a President marched down historic Pennsylvania avenue on foot. President Wilson avenue on foot. President Wilson established the precedent today when he marched in the gigantic parade being held here as a tribute to the American flag and a plea for preparedness.

A marine band preceded Wilson The President walked jauntily. wors a blue serge coat with white dock trousers and white shees and socks. A straw hat topped his cos-tume. In his right hand he carried a silk flag.

The President's rapid stride car-

ried him over a mile and a half in little more than fifteen minutes. When he passed the Congressional Union delegation, the latter unfurled a monster banner, reading: "Be Pre-pared. If you care about an elecoral vote, consider us, the Woman's Party." Mr. Wilson looked, smiled and then passed on. Everyone of the 75,000 or more marchers car-ried a flag. Some had two.
