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ENGLISH WIN IMPORTANT VICTORY

AFRAID THAT ALLIED SHIPS MAY COME IN 3-MI. LIMIT

Captain of Deutschland Fears That They Will Not Give the Submarine a Fair Chance Outside of Capes.

Baltimore, July 26.—The one besetting fear of Captain Koenig and the crew of the Deutschland is the possibility that the warships of the allies will be so zealous in their attempt to capture the submarine that they might overstep the three-mile limit. The mysterious movements of the allied patrol ships furnish the basis for this belief. In the meantime, a British tramp steamer lies anchored across the path that the Deutschland will have to take and is in a position to report every movement.

During the early hours this morning, the tug Timmons engaged in a mysterious loading of some cargo on board of the submarine. Several times lights were extinguished in order to prevent watchers from seeing what was transported on board.

Captain Koenig and his crew do not believe that the submarine, Bremen, is in trouble. They still insist that she will dock here.

AMERICAN CITIZENS ORDERED TO LEAVE ENGLAND AT ONCE

London, July 26.—British authorities today informed American Ambassador Page that S. S. McClure, the American publisher, must leave England by Saturday. It was learned today that this order was issued because McClure's "activities with the Germans."

Thomas Kelly and wife and assistant, Joseph Smith, were also ordered deported and they will possibly leave on the same boat that McClure will take.

Action Causes Surprise.
Washington, July 26.—The United States will ask Great Britain why she refused admittance to Kelly and his party, it was learned today, following the receipt at the State Department of a report from Ambassador Page. At that time the State Department had not yet been officially informed of McClure's deportation. The department expressed surprise over the Kelly action, as it is understood that his passports were voided by the British embassy.

STATE GETS \$114,281 FOR ROADS

N. S. OPERATES TRAINS OVER COAST LINE

LINE FROM HERE TO GREENVILLE WILL NOT BE USED ON ACCOUNT OF BROKEN TRESTLE.

LOCAL TRAINS CANCELED

Only Through Trains Will Be Run Over Coast Line Tracks. Hope to Have Damage Repaired by Sunday.

Due to the wreck at Grimesland yesterday, in which a number of freight cars broke through a trestle, the Norfolk Southern will run all through trains over the Washington & Vandremer crossing, on the other side of the river, over the Atlantic Coast Line to Farmville, then to Greenville, and connect with its own tracks at the latter point.

Work on repairing the trestle is now in progress and it is expected that the line will be opened again by Sunday.

In the meantime, the local freight between Washington and Greenville has been cancelled. Also trains No. 17 and 18, between Washington and Raleigh have been cancelled. These are the trains which leave Washington at 6:35 in the morning and arrive here at 7:30 in the evening.

WHOLE OF POZIERES NOW HELD BY BRITISH

ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT VICTORIES OF THE WESTERN FRONT IS ACHIEVED BY BRITISH SOLDIERS

POINT GAINED IS AN IMPORTANT ONE

London, July 26.—After three days' desperate hand to hand fighting and grubbing in mud-crumbled masonry, Great Britain's soldiers have finally taken the whole of Pozieres.

"All Pozieres is now held," was General Haig's laconic report, received here today.
The war has seen no fiercer fighting than at this point, where for weeks the Teutons stubbornly, desperately and tenaciously held on in face of death everywhere, because of the strategic importance of the place. The Australian and New Zealand soldiers literally pushed them out of the village.

The feat marks the most important victory that has been won recently by either side for some time on the western front.

VILLA SNIPERS INTRENCH AND FIRE UPON GUARDSMEN

El Paso, July 26.—While the international situation in Mexico gradually is reaching a fresh boiling point, a serious international complication is developing rapidly on the border here. It is the result of repeated attacks on militia outposts by Mexican snipers.
