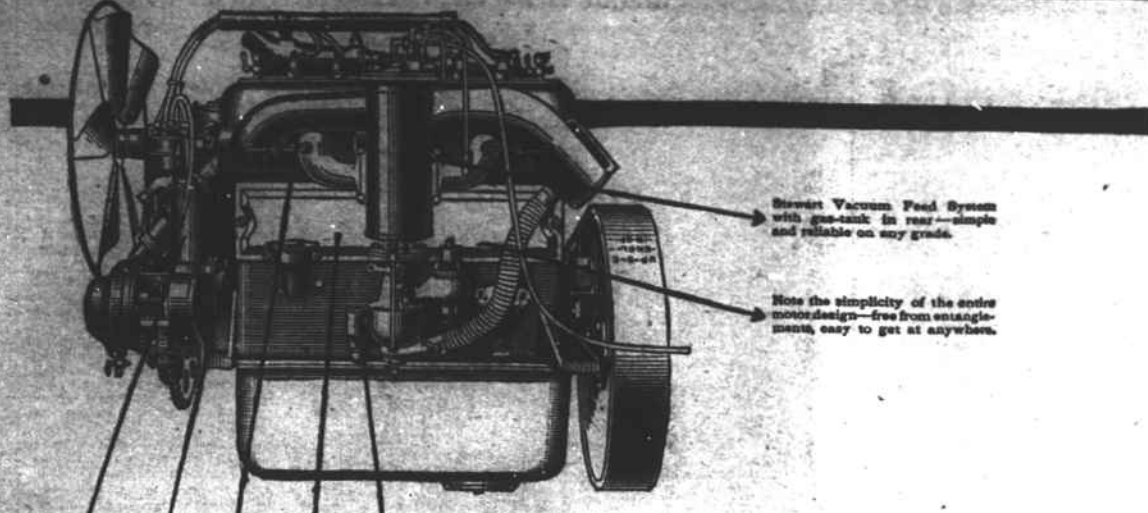

**INFANTILE PARALYSIS IS SPREADING IN OTHER STATES**

**Eight States, Besides New York, Report Large Number of Cases**

New York, Aug. 12.—A revised report of the States which are fighting the infantile paralysis epidemic, shows the following cases:

**New Jersey.**  
 Trenton, N. J., Aug. 11.—Dr. Jacob C. Price, director of the State Department of Health, reports that 1,320 cases of infantile paralysis have thus far been reported in the State. Strict quarantine measures are being prepared. Heretofore the matter has been left to local health officers. No definite action has been taken as yet, but it is probable that the opening of schools will be delayed at least one month.

**Connecticut.**  
 Hartford, Conn., Aug. 10.—There are now 205 cases of infantile paralysis reported from various parts of the State.

**Pennsylvania.**  
 Philadelphia, Aug. 11.—State Health Commissioner Dixon has received reports of 312 cases of infantile paralysis in the State. There have been fifty-four deaths since July 1. A strict quarantine is observed at houses where cases have been discovered and at the State border. Children under sixteen years must have health certificates in order to travel. The situation appears to be improving and no decision has been reached regarding a possible postponement of the date of school opening.

**Rhode Island.**  
 Providence, Aug. 11.—Forty-one cases of infantile paralysis have been reported in this State, with seven deaths. No quarantine regulations have been enforced as yet, but they are being considered by the State Board of Health. It appears probable that the schools will open on schedule time. Dr. Gardner C. Swartz, of the Health Board, suggests watch-

**AMERICA SEEN AS BRITISH ALLY BY REVENTLOW**

Berlin, Aug. 12.—Wherever and whenever a voice has been raised in America since the beginning of the war they have, without exception, cried: "Germany must not conquer; must not be too powerful."

This attitude is partly due to the growing conviction that the Panama Canal is a failure and never will be available for battleships, and thus America has more to fear from Japan.

Had the Americans really desired the freedom of the seas it would have been in their power to secure it, but America has placed itself in opposition to the German Empire for fear it might harm, or, indeed, annihilate British-American traffic.

Moreover, just as a strong American fleet in the Pacific is essential to Britain, so is a strong British fleet in the Atlantic necessary for the United States.

In the future the Anglo-Saxon nations, perhaps marching independently, will stand opposed to the German Empire and the German people.

**FAMOUS TRAMP IS NOW DYING**

Milwaukee, Aug. 12.—William Newman, "the millionaire tramp" is dying in the National Soldiers' home here today. A few years ago he was one of the most widely known and most romantic figures in American trampdom.

"Big Ben" as he was called, was born in Denmark and graduated from the University of Copenhagen. He came to the United States when 18 and traveled about the country, making his expenses by lecturing on reform ideas. He visited nearly every city on the face of the earth and paid only \$1.28 railroad fare. He was arrested 608 times.

He lectured on child labor, prison reform and abolition of white slavery. In 1913 he was instrumental in having 250 children removed from sweatshops in Joliet, Ill. For three years he was the companion of Jack London.

"I have done my best to make the world see its evils and to correct them," said Newman. "I have fought the good fight and I am near the end of my race. I can't win against the white plague."

Big Ben's life is going out very rapidly. It is believed he can survive only a few weeks. One of the romantic characters stories in American life will be written to its end when he dies.
