

A few years ago he was one of the most widely known and most romantic figures in American trampdom. "Big Ben" as he was called we born in Denmark and graduated from the University of Copenhagen. He came to the United States when 18 and traveled about the country, mak ing his expenses by lecturing on reform ideas. He visited nearly every city on the face of the earth and paid only \$1.28 railroad fare. He was arrested 605 times. He lectured on child labor, priso reform and abolition of white slav-ery. In 1913 he was instrumental in having 250 children removed from sweatshops in Jeliet. Ill. For three years he was the companion of Jack London. "I have done my best to make the world see its evils and to correct them," said Newman. "I have fought the good fight and I am near the end of my race. I can't win against th white plague. Big Ben's life is going out very

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
