## STOCK-RAISING TURNING SOUTHWARD.

Much has been said of late regarding stock raising in this section. Several cities have been discussing the project of erecting packing plants and a general interest is being manifested in all matters per taining to the raising and marketing of stock.

In a recent issue, the Virginian-Pilot carried an interesting article which showed the tendency of the stock grower to foresake the West and turn to the South as a more logical place in which to pursue the industry. The article reads as follows:

As illustrating how stock-raisers from the West are being attracted to the South, the Manufacturers' Record carries, under the Jacksonville date line, a special dispatch announcing that Mr. Mark R. Tennant, of Shux City, Iowa, has recently purchased ten thousand acres of land in De Soto County, near Fort Meyer, Florida, which he will begin at once to stock with high grade cattle. More than that, Mr. Tennant is quoted as declaring that "in his estimation, Florida is destined to become the greatest eartle raising and marketing State in he Union" and that this result will be greatly accelerated by "a large influx of Northern and Western farmers who will enter the stockraising business.

The advantages which Florida has to offer for stock-raising-cheap lands and a climate which obviates the necessity and expense of stallfeeding by furnishing pasturage practically the year round-are shared, in greater or less degree, by all the States on the South Atlan-tic scaboard and the Gulf Coast. Now that the cattle tick is rapidly approaching the point of elimination, the one thing needed to insure improvement of these advantages on a constantly enlarging scale is the establishment of packing houses to afford local markets for the eattle, sheep and hogs raised. Georgia and Florida have begun to give practical recognition to this fact, with the result that the live-stock industry is rapidly expanding in both. North Carolina is preparing to do likewise, and Virginia should not delay to fall in line An up-to-date packing house at Norfolk would prove not only a profi-table investment for those undertaking the enterprise, but also of great benefit to the farmers in Tidewater Virginia and Eastern Carolina


## ONLY STOCKS TUMBLED.
