This matter, going from person to person in her efforts to secure funds. This department communicated with Dr. Fay, eye specialist of Wilmington who readily agreed to make the examinations free of charge, and Dr. Fay was instrumental in getting the City Optical Company of Wilmington to furnish the glasses at wholesale cost.

"Mrs. Johnson told me that she had already started a campaign to raise funds to buy a radio for the county home. I am sure that it will not be long before the county home residents will have this radio, because Mrs. Johnson has demonstrated her ability to get things done when she starts."

A rescue ship snatched 22 seamen from one of two sinking English freighters Sunday night, but the 37 men aboard the other vessel were not found . . . General Adolphus Greely, famous Arctic explorer, died in a Washington hospital Sunday . . . Storm warnings were forecast in the region South of Jamaica Sunday.

Emperor Haile Selassie declared Saturday that the use of bombing planes by the Italians was contrary to the Ethiopian idea of gallantry in war . . . Action of the League of Nations Saturday declared an economic boycott against Italy . . . A democratic attack on the American Liberty League today topped off a week of one-sided political activity marked by the disagreement among Republicans over 1936 issues . . . The morning papers carried screaming headlines of football news . . . Numbered among the major upsets in Saturday's warfare was Georgia Tech's 6-0 victory of Duke University's favored Blue Devils . . . North Carolina State college lost a bitter battle to the University of Georgia Bulldogs . . . The University of North Carolina maintained her perfect record for the season with a 14-0 win over

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Davidson college.

Julius C. Smith of Greensboro was elected Friday to serve as President of the North Carolina Bar Association . . . The first day of November will bring to an end the program of direct relief, according to Aubrey Williams, acting Work Relief Administrator . . . In a statement issued Friday Italian officials indicated that "all doors are not shut" to a peaceful settlement of her differences with Great Britain over the Ethiopian war.

A motor monster, designed by "Death Valley" Scotly for desert travel, made its appearance Thursday . . . Called the "desert camel," this automobile carried a gasoline supply of 100 gallons and a tank for 10 gallons of oil . . . A huge consignment of arms manufactured in Italy started Wednesday for the frontier to be used by the Ethiopians to kill Italian soldiers . . . Merchants of death have no scruples . . . In a speech read Thursday night by his wife, President Fran-

klin D. Roosevelt called for public support of the national policy of peace.
