Farm Questions

Question: Can soybean oil meal be used in feeding poultry?

Answer: This meal is one of the most complete vegetable proteins, but is lacking in mineral content and should not be used to replace all of the animal proteins in poultry feeds. In view of the shortage and high price of animal protein supplements, it is probable that soybean oil meal can be used to replace a part of these supplements. However, where fish meal or meat scrap is cheap, only a small quantity of the oil meal should be substituted.

Question: Is there any ingredient that I can put in pure beef tallow to bleach it and keep it from being rancid?

Answer: The addition of two tablespoons full of baking soda to each 100 pounds of tallow will bleach the mixture. This should be put in while cooking and after the tallow reaches the boiling point. This also removes some of the rancid odor, but the best way to keep the tallow from becoming rancid is to clean all cooking vessels thoroughly and cook properly. If the tallow is handled properly throughout the cooking and cooling process there will be very little odor and it will have better keeping qualities.

Question: What single spray will control scale insects and leaf curl disease on peaches?

Answer: A lime sulphur spray, either liquid or powder, will control both insects and disease. This should be applied any time between now and just before the buds swell. After the buds swell, this application will not control peach leaf curl disease. Where an oil spray is used for control of scale insects a 3-4-50 Bordeaux mixture must be added. When making this combination spray the Bordeaux should be made first and then the oil added. In making liquid lime sulphur use 6 gallons lime-sulphur to 50 gallons of the spray. For the dry mix 15 pounds of dry lime sulphur should be used to 50 gallons of spray.

May Unite

Eight million members of three Methodist denominations were offered their first glimpse Saturday night of a plan that would emerge them into one united church. Bishop E. D. Mouzon, Charlotte, senior bishop of the Southern church, made public for the first time basic details of recommendations to united Southern and Northern Methodists and the Methodist Protestant church. The entire program will be announced December 12.

In South Carolina

Governor Olin Johnston, ousting the state highway commission by quasi-judicial processes when the supreme court reinstated it after a military coup, Saturday called the South Carolina legislature into extra session to enact a law for the popular election of the commission. The governor announced he was summoning the legislators to meet at noon Tuesday to provide for the temporary administration of the highway department, which he kept under military control despite the court decision, until legislation is enacted to permit the people to vote a new commission into office.

Place Bombed

Italy struck directly at the heart of Ethiopia Friday, bombing Emperor Haile Selassie's palace in Dessaye. The emperor himself escaped the rain of death from the sky but occupants of a Red Cross hospital tent were not so fortunate. A Belgian major and a Norwegian nurse were wounded. Although the emperor was not in his palace, he was not dodging out of the way of the raid. He personally seized a machine gun and fired at the attack group.

Supports President

Senator George W. Norris Friday pledged his support to President Roosevelt's re-election but announced that he himself will "not seek renomination."

Drys Fight

The Anti-Saloon league's drive assumed the proportions of anti-administration movement Wednesday as dry leaders celebrated the second anniversary of repeal by predicting an organized dry sentiment would oppose the re-election of President Roosevelt in 1936.

Visits Hauptmann

Governor Harold G. Hoffman of New Jersey Wednesday disclosed that he had visited Bruno Richard Hauptmann in his death

cell at Trenton, N. J. This disclosure followed reports published in the New York Evening Journal that the governor had obtained new information which might save the convicted slayer of the Lindbergh baby from the electric chair, or "at least delay his execution indefinitely." Governor Hoffman said that his visit to Hauptmann occurred about a month ago.

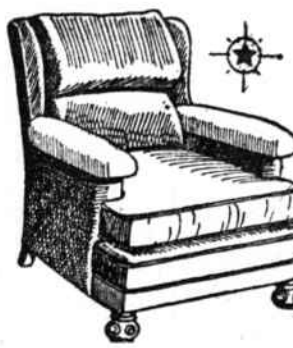
