Curved Furrows Save The Soil

There Is General Tendency All Over The Nation To Change Contour Of Furrows In Cultivated Field

Like long lines of fire hose at a third-alarm fire, or miniature front line trenches, contour furrows are beginning to stretch across hillside pastures in soil conservation projects of the United States Department of Agri- culture.

Typical of the specialized ma- chinery being developed to con- serve the nation's soil resources is the ingenious device in use on the Mankato, Kans., project. A U-knife slices a strip of sod some 4 inches deep and about 16 in- ches wide. Curved rods place the

uniform strips, grass side up, on the downhill side of the furrow. An attached roller, slightly con- cave so as to give more pressure at the edges, packs the strip firmly into place. The machine is pulled by truck, team, or trac- tor.

Within a year or two grass covers the bottom and sides of the furrow, so that there is no loss of pasturage. Water that once ran away now soaks into the soil or creeps slowly along the serpentine furrows.
